

COMMISSIONER ASHBROOK: Ladies and gentlemen, if I could have everybody find a seat if there is one. Get comfortable is there's not. The Mayor is not here yet but it is 10:01. I'm going to go ahead and call this special meeting of the city commission to order at this time. Jim?

JIM ANDERSON: Yes, sir. I was called in, the mayor actually came into my office yesterday morning, approximately 9 o'clock and asked for my resignation. I told the mayor that I was not resigning. He called for an immediate meeting today for the resignation of the city manager, so that's why we're here today.

COMMISSIONER ASHBROOK: Okay. Is there any discussion amongst the board?

COMMISSIONER BUZZETT: Well yeah, I would like to say a few words. I've worked with Jim for ten years, and I'd kind of like to walk you through a typical Jim Anderson work week. He comes to work around 8 o'clock most every morning, leaves at 5:00. Doesn't go to a cookout, doesn't go have drinks with his buddies, doesn't play golf. He goes home to his family. That's Monday through Friday. Saturday sometimes he and his dad will go fishing when he's not -- not with his wife and children. Sunday he

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goes to church. Next Monday he repeats it all over again 52 weeks out of the year. I think maybe he's gone on vacation sometime. I don't remember when it was but wasn't for very long if he did. And so you know Jim's a native of Port St. Joe. He loves the city. He works hard for the city and he doesn't sit in his office filing his nails and eating bon bons. He's a hard worker. And with that being said I'd like to throw out a proposal to the board that we have a workshop. Any commissioner that has a problem with Jim or where he has deficiencies, let's work through those deficiencies. And I think in the end result it will be better for the board and it will be better for Jim, and we can all -- all work together. We've got to, you know to make this city go forward we need to, we need to work together. I'd like to hear from the other commissioners if they feel like a workshop would be in order. think that's proper way to get this get resolved.

COMMISSIONER ASHBROOK: Commissioner Buzzett I will absolutely mirror what you just said there and to add to that about a year ago when I returned back from the League of Cities conference I brought back about 17 examples of reviews that we can do for out staff that work directly for the board. I think in

that workshop we need to definitely do that. How can you hold someone to a standard when they don't know what the standard is? So if anyone has a problem, we need to make sure that we let them know what that problem is.

I would like to see us move forward with that process. I sill have those 17 examples. I can hand those over to our attorney and have them tailor one for our needs.

(Mayor Patterson arrives at the meeting.)

MAYOR PATTERSON: Sorry for being late everybody. Where we at?

COMMISSIONER ASHBROOK: It's all yours now Mayor.

MAYOR PATTERSON: Where we at? Tell me where we at.

COMMISSIONER ASHBROOK: We're discussing amongst the board. Two of us have spoke.

MAYOR PATTERSON: Okay. If I could just interject for just one moment just you know to let everybody know, we're here today. I appreciate everybody being here. We do need your input on everything on we do. This is a personnel matter within the city, and we're here today.

I would like to comment just a minute on the

memo that was sent out about this meeting today.

The memo says termination of city manager, Mayor

Patterson. That's not what I had asked to be put on
here and that's one of my problems today. This

thing is getting misconstrued when I said it.

I did say I wanted to have a meeting today because when I got all those calls on Wednesday afternoon with all the extra things that were not true, some things were true but there were a lot of untruths. A lot of them. So we're here today to discuss Jim Anderson is our city attorney —

UNIDENTIFIED: No.

MAYOR PATTERSON: — and him being able — him being able to lead us in this city matter. But the paperwork here said termination. My words were discussion of the city manager. I never used the word termination I guarantee everybody in this room that. I had a witness in the room with me when I talked, and I will go back and ask that person to clarify that, but I'm pretty sure I didn't say termination. I've never said termination. So I just wanted to make that — that pretty clear.

And just would to like to address the audience today that you will have your turn to speak. There are quite a few people here today so I would ask you

to, we're going to limit you to three minutes. I would ask you to stay on the agenda item, and I would ask you to refrain from clapping, loud hollering. Let's all be respectful of one another. And when we get to your turn if you'll just raise your hand, I will point you to come up. And then when you do come up if you would just sign that paper right there before you start talking and then give us your name and your address. All right?

COMMISSIONER LOWRY: Can I just say something?
MAYOR PATTERSON: Sure.

light I've received numerous text messages that were untrue. I've called some of those people back and discussed what was going on. Continued to receive phone calls and hateful text messages, and most of that untrue. My wife's received phone calls and text messages, and it's -- we're a tightknit community and it's, this has got out of control. I mean I understand people's feelings and -- and one way or another, but it's bad when it gets hateful. It's bad when it gets hateful in a campaign race that's going on right now.

I mean it's -- I ask everybody to continue our tightknit, tightknitness that we have within this

community. Anybody else anything?

COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: I had many, many phone calls, many, many texts, text messages. I've had text messages from friends and have spoken to a lot of people in my community about the situation, and I'm my own man. I make my own decisions. I'm not a yes man. I don't appreciate some of the text messages that were sent out. If you want to see me, you know where to see me at. I'm not hard to find. I'm not a coward.

I just want to say that I support my community. I support the entire city of Port St. Joe, but I was born and raised in north Port St. Joe, Florida, and the opportunities that we've been denied for so long because we haven't had a voice, that's what I'm making my decision on. So if anybody got any questions or want to see me, you know where to find me at.

MAYOR PATTERSON: That all Commissioner?

COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: That's it.

MAYOR PATTERSON: Okay. Gentlemen, none of this is easy. Don't look at us and think this is easy for us because it's not. We have a hard job to do sometimes, and we have to make decisions.

Sometimes they're the right ones, sometimes they're

not the right ones, but we hope that we make the right decision. But as I say, at this time I have lost confidence in Jim Patterson being able to run the day-to-day operations of the city, and you know that's where I'm at with it. I just --

COMMISSIONER BUZZETT: Mayor, I spoke earlier. You weren't here, and I threw out a proposal for a -- a workshop to work through the deficiencies, work through the problems with Jim, let him know what we expect of him. And at the end of the day, like I said, I believe it would be positive for us, a good learning experience for us as well as Jim, and then we can all work together for the better of the city.

I would like us to seriously consider that. I don't know if it needs to come to a vote or we can just agree to have a workshop but that's what I'd like to see.

COMMISSIONER LOWRY: Commissioners Buzzett, I think I'm past that, and I'm -- I'm to the point where I've also lost confidence in our city manager to perform the abilities to run our city, I'm going to put that in the form of a motion to terminate his contract without cause and pay him his leave --

AUDIENCE: Without cause?

COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: -- pay him -(Mayor Patterson uses the gavel.)

MAYOR PATTERSON: Remember what I said to start with. Let's be respectful. That's all I ask you, to be respectful. No loud -- you'll have your turn to speak. Everybody -- we will try to let everybody we can speak today but please --

UNIDENTIFIED: We need to know why the circumstance, why he's --

MAYOR PATTERSON: Ma'am, you don't have the floor right now.

UNIDENTIFIED: -- should be terminated.

MAYOR PATTERSON: In a minute I'll let you have it. And you can ask any questions you want to ask. It's just the procedure that we go through here. And like I said, we're going to let everybody talk. We're going to limit you to three minutes because there's such a large crowd here, we'd be here until tomorrow sometime.

UNIDENTIFIED: Mr. Mayor.

MAYOR PATTERSON: Yes.

UNIDENTIFIED: I think everybody in here has that same interest, and I think before there's any vote that you should, you owe it to the citizens of this community that have voted all of y'all in --

1 AUDIENCE: Yes, sir. 2 UNIDENTIFIED: -- before you do anything --3 (Audience applause.) 4 (Mayor Patterson uses the gavel.) 5 MAYOR PATTERSON: If I have an outbreak of clappening one more time, I will clear this room. 6 7 (Audience laughter.) 8 MAYOR PATTERSON: I have asked you -- I'm 9 asking you to be respectful. I mean I'm just asking 10 everybody to be respectful. UNIDENTIFIED: No, sir. 11 12 MAYOR PATTERSON: You're going to get your turn 13 to talk. Everybody's going to get a turn. UNIDENTIFIED: Well can you respect our 14 question and answer it please? 15 16 UNIDENTIFIED: Exactly. COMMISSIONER ASHBROOK: Mr. Mayor, if I can, I 17 think the question is if there was a motion made, 18 was it for cause, was it for without cause, or is it 19 for loss of faith and ability to perform duties? 20 think that's the question everyone's asking. And if 21 it is for cause, what is that cause. 22 MAYOR PATTERSON: I wasn't prepared to so a 23 whole lot of talking today, maybe --24 25 UNIDENTIFIED: That's what you're hired for.

UNIDENTIFIED: You're the mayor. 1 2 UNIDENTIFIED: And this gentleman politely asked you, and it was seconded, politely asked you 3 4 why. 5 MAYOR PATTERSON: And there's going to be a time for them to speak. 6 7 UNIDENTIFIED: Why. MAYOR PATTERSON: It's just not --8 9 UNIDENTIFIED: No, sir, No, sir, it is, the time is now. The gentleman politely asked --10 MAYOR PATTERSON: Before we make a vote, you 11 will speak. Before a vote, you will speak. 12 UNIDENTIFIED: Well he needs to give a why 13 14 we're going to kick out the finest administrator we have. 15 MAYOR PATTERSON: Uh-huh. 16 17 UNIDENTIFIED: Yes, sir, why. MAYOR PATTERSON: Well let me just go ahead and 18 19 state something. UNIDENTIFIED: Now if you give us why then we 20 can make our own decision. 21 MAYOR PATTERSON: Let go ahead and state 22 23 something. I wasn't going to state this in here today, but you're forcing me to. 24 UNIDENTIFIED: Yes, sir. 25

MAYOR PATTERSON: Along with my reasons for Jim being dismissed I have lived the last seven months in fear of my life.

(Laughter from the audience.)

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MAYOR PATTERSON: Go ahead and laugh about it. He threatened me.

UNIDENTIFIED: Everybody give the gentleman a speaking chance. We asking -- you tell us why now. We'll respect you.

MAYOR PATTERSON: Sure, exactly.

Last September we were going through budget session. I was trying to save you citizens some money plus get you some more time for my code enforcement, okay? I went to Mr. Anderson's office and told him my intentions. Told him what I was going to do. I went upstairs. I talked to the code I got him to commit to more hours, enforcement. giving us two Saturdays a month, and he wasn't working any Saturdays. I got him to drop his pay from \$20 to \$18. It would have been about the same money but at least he got more hours, he wouldn't get more pay. When I went and discussed it with him, we had a good discussion, I went back downstairs. I told Mr. Anderson what we'd talked about. He said okay. I said if you don't mind,

call the other commissioners and see what they think about it. Now later on he told me that I told him to tell the commissioners. I ain't never told him to tell nobody nothing. I can tell you that right now. I don't do that. I ask. I don't do that. I really don't.

So at that time I thought everything was fine.

Come up to a meeting a few days later, and I thought everything was fine as I say, so I'm fixing to tell the crowd what all was going on with the code enforcer, and I'm interrupted by Mr. Anderson who said that's not my job. That's his job. My question is why didn't he tell me that when I was face to face with him in his office? Why would he wait until meeting time to do it?

UNIDENTIFIED: Why don't you --

MAYOR PATTERSON: He just wanted to embarrass me or what? I don't know what it was, but I'm getting to it if you'll give me time.

UNIDENTIFIED: We will.

MAYOR PATTERSON: All right, you asked me to speak, and I'm speaking --

UNIDENTIFIED: Yes, sir, go ahead.

MAYOR PATTERSON: -- from what I know is right.

UNIDENTIFIED: I apologize, go ahead.

MAYOR PATTERSON: That's okay.

But anyway, the next morning I went in and talked to Mr. Anderson about what had happened at the meeting, and we was just having you know fairly general conversation about what happened. We weren't hollering and yelling at one another or nothing, but just like he's doing right now, he looked at me and smiled and smirked and pointed his finger at me. He said, "Mr. Mayor, if you don't leave me alone, I'm going to bring fire and fury on you."

UNIDENTIFIED: Whoo.

MAYOR PATTERSON: Hey, I went straight to the sheriff's office because I believed him. I believed what he told me. He had no reason to lie to me. He was going to bring fire and fury, and it sounds funny to y'all, but if you were me --

UNIDENTIFIED: Was there a witness to that?

MAYOR PATTERSON: -- and somebody's threatened you with your life, it wouldn't be funny. I guarantee you it wouldn't. It wouldn't be funny.

And that's what happened that day in his office.

Regardless of what he may say later I'm not the liar, that's what was said, and I'll promise you that.

1	I'm here to help everybody in this town.
2	That's all I always said when I come on board. I'm
3	here to help everybody. That's the only reason I'm
4	a mayor is to help people.
5	SAMUEL AMERSON: Mr. Mayor
6	MAYOR PATTERSON: But that's one reason why.
7	SAMUEL AMERSON: Is that the only reason?
8	MAYOR PATTERSON: No, sir, there are some other
9	reasons.
10	SAMUEL AMERSON: That's your only reason? Just
11	one?
12	MAYOR PATTERSON: No, sir, there's more.
13	SAMUEL AMERSON: There's more. Okay, I'm
14	sorry, I thought that was "the" reason.
15	MAYOR PATTERSON: That is one reason, yes, sir.
16	SAMUEL AMERSON: Okay, go ahead. My name is
17	Samuel Warren Amerson, Sr.
18	MAYOR PATTERSON: Yes, sir.
19	SAMUEL AMERSON: I live beside Mr. Anderson.
20	MAYOR PATTERSON: Yes, sir.
21	SAMUEL AMERSON: I before I would like to
22	ask you this real quick.
23	MAYOR PATTERSON: Time out. Time out. If you
24	don't mind, would you let us get this done, and
25	then we'll bring you up and let you talk.

SAMUEL AMERSON: Yes, sir.

MAYOR PATTERSON: Because we really need you to come up to the podium.

SAMUEL AMERSON: Yes, sir, okay.

CE WIFE: I'd like to say something as the wife of the code enforcement officer. The day you had that conversation with him in his office, keep in mind he served this county 27 years flawlessly as a sheriff's deputy. He works part time for the city, and the day you had that conversation with him in his office, I had to take him to the emergency room because they thought he was having a heart attack because his blood pressure was so high.

Did you or did you not tell him you'd also have his job if he did not work every other Saturday?

MAYOR PATTERSON: No, ma'am, I did not.

CE WIFE: Every other Saturday is the only day --

MAYOR PATTERSON: I did not tell him that. No, ma'am, I did not.

CE WIFE: Every other Saturday is the only day he has to spend with our children. He works 13 days straight without a day off.

MAYOR PATTERSON: Well maybe he should resign and get another job --

1	CE WIFE: He has
2	MAYOR PATTERSON: if he can't do the job for
3	the city.
4	AUDIENCE: Whoo.
5	MAYOR PATTERSON: I mean we hired him to do a
6	job.
7	CE WIFE: He does the job.
8	MAYOR PATTERSON: But anyway, let's
9	CE WIFE: He does the job.
10	MAYOR PATTERSON: continue on with
11	with
12	CE WIFE: He does the job. He brings
13	MAYOR PATTERSON: Let's stay with the item
14	CE WIFE: does answer me this, does he
15	not bring a lot of money to the city with the title
16	searches, fines, all of that?
17	UNIDENTIFIED: I want to hear the rest of your
18	grievance with
19	AUDIENCE: Yeah.
20	UNIDENTIFIED: Come on, Mr. Mayor.
21	MAYOR PATTERSON: All right, we got a motion on
22	the floor. Do we have a second?
23	UNIDENTIFIED: What was the motion?
24	UNIDENTIFIED: For what?
25	COMMISSIONER ASHBROOK: Clarify the motion.

1 What was it? 2 UNIDENTIFIED: You're not going to vote until 3 we have --4 MAYOR PATTERSON: Not until we talk to y'all. Not until we talk to y'all. We just getting a 5 motion going. 6 7 UNIDENTIFIED: They got to have a second first. MAYOR PATTERSON: Yeah, we got to have a second 8 9 and then we're going to ask for your input. We're going to do this thing very calmly. 10 COMMISSIONER ASHBROOK: The motion was on the 11 floor to terminate Mr. Anderson without cause. Pay 12 13 him his leave based on his policy and his severance. 14 MAYOR PATTERSON: All right, I have a motion. Do I have a second? 15 COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: I'd like to say 16 17 something first. UNIDENTIFIED: Excuse me just a second. Didn't 18 Rex bring a motion up before anybody did? 19 UNIDENTIFIED: He sure did. 20 21 UNIDENTIFIED: Did you Rex? COMMISSIONER BUZZETT: No, I made a proposal 22 23 for a workshop. UNIDENTIFIED: I thought you made a motion, not 24 25 a workshop.

COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: I'd like to say something first. Hold it down please.

UNIDENTIFIED: Hey.

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COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: I've known Jim most of my life, and me, my decision is dedicated to the people of Port St. Joe, Florida. My concern is about North Port St. Joe. What I believe is that there are certain things that should have been done on North Port St. Joe that hadn't been done. And if you need it, I can explain everything to you.

First, the North Port St., since I've been the commissioner I found out that there's all other kind of income that you can get for low income city, low income communities, opportunities zone funding. It was pushed back, the rezoning of Martin Luther Kind Boulevard which was discussed several times in 2017 Publicly several times and it hasn't been moved forward. And I — I've received phone calls from my constituents on North, in North Port St. Joe, and they haven't had a voice to represent them in years. So my job is first of all the entire community, secondly is to take care of my community which I was born and raised in, so with that said, I think that we need to start over and find us a new city manager.

1	UNIDENTIFIED: Some new commissioners.
2	MAYOR PATTERSON: So is that your second?
3	COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: I second it.
4	MAYOR PATTERSON: We have a first and a second,
5	and if anyone in the audience wants to speak, please
6	raise your hand. I saw that one in the back first.
7	UNIDENTIFIED WOMAN: Well he's standing right
8	there.
9	UNIDENTIFIED: I'm standing right here.
10	UNIDENTIFIED WOMAN: How can you
11	MAYOR PATTERSON: I saw that one first.
12	UNIDENTIFIED: Mayor
13	MAYOR PATTERSON: I wasn't I saw that one
14	first.
15	UNIDENTIFIED: May I speak? May I speak later?
16	MAYOR PATTERSON: Yes, sir.
17	UNIDENTIFIED: I'd like to tell everybody about
18	him threatening to kill me.
19	AUDIENCE: What?
20	COMMISSIONER ASHBROOK: Hold on, Jim wants to
21	speak. Jim wants to speak.
22	JIM ANDERSON: I just have one quick thing to
23	say.
24	MAYOR PATTERSON: Sign in. Yes, sir, hold it
25	right there.

UNIDENTIFIED: Yes, sir.

work for the citizens of Port St. Joe. Yes, I work at the direction of the city commission. I'm trying to do the best job I can for the people and the money, and I've not broken any laws of the State of Florida or any ordinances within the City of Port St. Joe. At this point I ask the board to follow the city charter. The city charter says per Section 34 of the City of Port St. Joe charter I demand written charges and a public hearing upon the same storm before the commission. And my removal shall not take effect until such hearing has been had, for the record.

MAYOR PATTERSON: Okay. Please sign in and state your name and address.

TURNER ECHOLS: My name's Turner Echols. I live at 805 16th Street.

MAYOR PATTERSON: Please stay on the agenda item --

TURNER ECHOLS: I am.

MAYOR PATTERSON: -- but you don't need to talk about me.

TURNER ECHOLS: Well no, you said he's, you've got charges against him. I want to talk about

you -- you -- you and me, and you threatening me. 1 MAYOR PATTERSON: I don't know what you're 2 3 talking about. TURNER ECHOLS: Of course you won't. You 4 won't --5 MAYOR PATTERSON: All I know is you wrote a 6 nasty letter about me and my girlfriend. It was all 7 8 lies. Now get back. 9 TURNER ECHOLS: Well no, last, last Tuesday --MAYOR PATTERSON: Chief, get this, get this man 10 11 away from the podium? TURNER ECHOLS: -- at Sister's Restaurant. 12 MAYOR PATTERSON: Chief, will you get this man 13 14 away from the podium? TURNER ECHOLS: At Sister's Restaurant, they --15 the mayor started calling me a liar. 16 MAYOR PATTERSON: No, Chief, Chief, get him out 17 of here. 18 TURNER ECHOLS: Sheriff Harrison, Sheriff 19 Harrison --20 MAYOR PATTERSON: I'm not going to --21 TURNER ECHOLS: Sheriff Harrison investigated a 22 threat to me that was made through his ex --23 UNIDENTIFIED WOMAN: I want to speak. I'm next 24 25 in line.

TURNER ECHOLS: -- his girlfriend to the ex. 1 2 well it was her husband at the time that he was 3 seeing --MAYOR PATTERSON: Where? 5 TURNER ECHOLS: -- because the mayor showed up at my house screaming and yelling. I have witnesses 6 7 for that. I have about 30 witnesses at Sister's. 8 MAYOR PATTERSON: How long ago was that? 9 TURNER ECHOLS: It was two and a half years 10 ago. 11 MAYOR PATTERSON: Okay --TURNER ECHOLS: That, yeah. But what happened 12 at Sister's last Tuesday is fresh. 13 MAYOR PATTERSON: Mr. Attorney? 14 MR. ALBRITTON: Yes. 15 MAYOR PATTERSON: What can I do in this 16 situation? He's not staying on the program. 17 TURNER ECHOLS: No, you talking about people 18 19 giving death threats, I've got witnesses of death threats by you and your girlfriend. 20 MR. ALBRITTON: Mayor, at this time since the 21 city manager's requested written charges and a 22 23 formal hearing --TURNER ECHOLS: You calling me a liar? 24 MR. ALBRITTON: -- I would suggest to the board 25

that we reconvene this so that he can have the 1 2 opportunity to see those written charges as he's so 3 demanded. MAYOR PATTERSON: All right, and we do no 4 action today? Is that what you're saying? 5 6 MR. ALBRITTON: The only action pursuant to the 7 charter that the city can take is to suspend him 8 pending the formal hearing that he has demanded. MAYOR PATTERSON: All right. 9 10 TURNER ECHOLS: You really don't want me to 11 talk, do you? MAYOR PATTERSON: I'll let --12 13 TURNER ECHOLS: Let's talk about calling me a liar. 14 MAYOR PATTERSON: Get him out of here. 15 UNIDENTIFIED: Sure can we talk --16 17 MAYOR PATTERSON: You want to talk about personal problems. 18 19 TURNER ECHOLS: I think you need a drug test. Will you submit to a drug test? You did a -- will 20 you submit to a drug test? 21 MAYOR PATTERSON: Chief. 22 REESE ANTLEY: Sir, sir, I've got some serious 23 questions, and it's not about personal --24 25 TURNER ECHOLS: This is serious.

MAYOR PATTERSON: Yes, sir, it sure is.

TURNER ECHOLS: It's real serious.

MAYOR PATTERSON: Yes, sir.

REESE ANTLEY: I agree, but I have some questions that are specific to what's going on.

TURNER ECHOLS: There's an investigation he doesn't know about.

MR. ALBRITTON: Again, Mayor, at this time the city manager's demanded --

MAYOR PATTERSON: Step to the side, please.

MR. ALBRITTON: -- the enforcement of Section 34 which requires written charges. The only action item at this point the city can take is to suspend him. If you read through the charter my suggestion is at the very least that this matter be reconvened so that the city can provide Mr. Anderson with the written charges he has so demanded and he is so entitled to.

The only other item that this commotion in regards to this can take up is whether or not to suspend him until such time that hearing has been had. There is, legally there's no other option for the city commission at this point. Mr. Anderson is entitled to his hearing, and he's entitled to his written charges. So the only action item right now

1 that the city can take as to Mr. Anderson is to 2 whether or not to suspend him until such time. What do we do with the 3 COMMISSIONER ASHBROOK: 4 motion? MR. ALBRITTON: You'd have to withdraw the 5 6 motion until such time as the hearing's been had. 7 After the hearing is concluded and Mr. Anderson's demand been met then the city will have to take 8 9 action at that point. COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: I would like, I would 10 11 like to hear what some of the citizens have to say 12 before we take anymore action. Whether we withdraw 13 the motion or whatever, but I would like to hear 14 what the citizens have to say. 15 UNIDENTIFIED: Absolutely. 16 COMMISSIONER LOWRY: We need to probably 17 withdraw? MAYOR PATTERSON: 18 Huh? 19 COMMISSIONER ASHBROOK: He needs to withdraw. COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: Yeah, I withdraw my 20 21 second. 22 COMMISSIONER LOWRY: I withdraw my first. MAYOR PATTERSON: All right. All right, now 23 Mr. Anderson has already asked for his public 24

hearing so we're going to still let the public talk,

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and we'll start with you, sir.

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REESE ANTLEY: All right, Reese Antley, 464
Anglefish Street.

First let me just say something to the commission. You guys work for us, the people. you can see by the people that are here and what you're going to hear next, Jim Anderson is the one person at city hall that stands for anything for the most part. I'm just being honest. There's a few people up there for the most part, but you guys work for us. To come in here and fire him without cause, the cause should be that the people are crying out for a termination or he's done something wrong. to state as you lost, Brett, you lost confidence, is that correct? So what is the -- why did you lose confidence? Has he done something in his job that you guys have reprimanded him for to lost confidence?

This isn't Bo's Pest Control. This isn't

Buzzett's Drugstore. This is the City of Port St.

Joe. This isn't Wood's Fishery where I can fire

whoever I want to whenever I want to. This is the

city. He works for us so why did you lose

confidence in him?

COMMISSIONER LOWRY: I'll discuss that later at

1 the hearing. REESE ANTLEY: This is the time to discuss it 2 3 so to us --COMMISSIONER LOWRY: I'll discuss it at the 4 5 hearing. MAYOR PATTERSON: He's asked for a hearing so. 6 REESE ANTLEY: I understand that but us as the 7 city, as the, as the people that put you in office, 8 9 that put every one of you in office, you owe us the 10 explanation so we can make our call on whether Jim should be fired or he should stay on. At this point 11 you guys are looking like you just have a vendetta 12 13 against Jim. 14 COMMISSIONER LOWRY: I promise we don't. haven't discussed that. 15 16 UNIDENTIFIED WOMAN: You can't handle the pressure you should resign. 17 REESE ANTLEY: And I'm just going to end with 18 19 this because there's a lot of people that want to 20 talk. MAYOR PATTERSON: Yes, sir. 21 22 REESE ANTLEY: But for the meeting that you 23 called at 10 o'clock you were late. They had to 24 start without our mayor.

MAYOR PATTERSON: And without our attorney.

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REESE ANTLEY: Well does that -- that to me is a write-up. If my people are late at work, you're written up.

You're in here with a bunch of people that took off work out of respect for everybody here. You should have been here on time.

MAYOR PATTERSON: I thought I was getting here on time.

REESE ANTLEY: Okay. Listen, I think you guys should be held to the same standard we are, and I'm not going down the petty thing, but I do believe you need to take a drug test and a sobriety test.

MAYOR PATTERSON: Thank you for your comment. Thank you.

Yes, ma'am.

PAULA PICKETT: My name is Paula Pickett, 108

Sunset Circle, Port St. Joe. I have worked in

public service through the county as well as the

chamber of commerce for over 14 years. I have

worked with three city managers. I have never

worked with a finer person that Jim Anderson. I

have met with him on a variety of occasions over the

last years. Never has he made any, any threatening

statements to me, and I have asked him some tough

questions, and we've jumped some hurdles together.

Never has he had anything but the utmost respect for me, and I would venture to say anybody else in this room that's been in his office.

He does work for me. He is the one I go to when I have problems. I've never called any one of you. You're welcome. I know how to get my problems solved, and Jim Anderson does it. And he does it respectfully and timely.

You guys have a hard job. I completely respect your ability to run for office. You've shown tenacity and thick skinness sometimes to your own detriment. I urge you to listen to these people. You may have lacked confidence for some personal reason with Jim, but nobody in here has. In fact I've got more confidence in him than I do any one of you.

MAYOR PATTERSON: Thank you, ma'am. Thank you.

AMY ROGERS: Amy Rogers, and I signed my name on the sign-in pad. I'm a registered voter, and a citizen of Port St. Joe.

I am concerned with, as I received one of your documents I did not see where there was any poor work performance, no evaluation that was taken place for Mr. Anderson's, the question to have him terminated. I, when I make a conscious decision on

voting, I want to know what I'm voting for. I just, I don't want to vote because so and so told me vote for this person and vote for that person, pass you a piece of paper and vote for that person. I'm a educated person, and I like to know what I'm voting for. And as I read the little paragraph all inside, according to the paragraphs again there's no evaluation been taken place, no, he has no discrepancies in his work performance, and I'd like to leave here today with some facts of what has happened regarding his work performance.

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Now if he's been insubordinated, I didn't see anything on insubordination. I feel like in a situation like this the city do, we still practice affirmative action where you have stated that you're a equal opportunity employee person. There is a process and a procedure that the city has gone about with other employees where they call a fact finding conference. With this particular matter it might be the city commissioners, but, and some of the peoples in his workplace area it would be a fact finding conference so they can go gather the facts up and then bring it back to the board and find out, that's when you act on it. But the one-day thing with no work, no work discrepancies and no problem with his

work performance, I can't vote on anything like that. And as a citizen and a registered voter, I want to be able to vote on facts, okay.

Let's do a workshop and as Commissioner Buzzett has stated earlier about a workshop so you can gather up the facts for an individual. And as what, I have to disagree with you a little bit Commissioner Langston. There have been some work that the city has done for North Port St. Joe.

COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: I didn't say the city didn't do any you know work for Port St. Joe. I said we've been deprived for a long time on the north side. That's what my statements was.

AMY ROGERS: Well -- okay, well then -- COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: I know you can't disagree with that.

AMY ROGERS: Yes, we have --

COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: If you disagree with that is, I don't understand what you're talking about.

AMY ROGERS: Well okay. Yes, we have socially been, we are socially deprived and been depressed for many, many years, but there are several things that the city has helped with North Port St. Joe -- COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: And they always have.

1 I never said they didn't. 2 AMY ROGERS: -- but they're still short, you 3 know. COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: I never said they 4 5 didn't. 6 AMY ROGERS: But we've --7 COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: I said we've been 8 deprived. 9 AMY ROGERS: Yeah, okay. COMMISSIONER LOWRY: That's what I said. 10 That's what I stated. 11 AMY ROGERS: Yes, sir, I agree with you on 12 13 we've been socially deprived. We are a socially deprived community, but with the fact that I do know 14 the city has helped some, but they're very short on 15 16 a lot of things that need to be done. majority of the things that need to be done is for 17 18 us to ask for. And all of our community, we want, 19 we want to stay in within the area that we can 20 receive funds with current CRA, but if we go and 21 restrict that to another section only --22 MAYOR PATTERSON: Well, Miss Amy, we're not 23 talking about the CRA's. We're not talking about 24 it.

I know. What I'm just saying that

AMY ROGERS:

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1 that's one of the ways that we get help. 2 sometimes we shoot our ownself in the foot --3 COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: Right --AMY ROGERS: -- and don't realize later on. 4 5 COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: -- like what you're 6 doing right now. 7 AMY ROGERS: So we want, what I'm saying right now is that we want to get some help for the entire 8 community and not stay, make -- work on being. 9 COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: I didn't say it -- I 10 11 said I'm, I represent the entire community. Yeah. 12 AMY ROGERS: COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: I said that before I 13 said anything about the north side. What I said was 14 15 I represent the entire community, but I was born and raised in North Port St. Joe, and we haven't had a 16 17 voice in 10 years, almost 10 years to come up and represent what we need over on the north side. 18 didn't say I didn't represent the entire North, 19 20 entire community of Port St. Joe, Florida, ma'am. AMY ROGERS: Okay, I'm not -- we have had --21 MAYOR PATTERSON: All right, your three minutes 22 23 is up, ma'am. AMY ROGERS: We have had many commissioners 24

African and American --

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MAYOR PATTERSON: Thank you, ma'am.

AMY ROGERS: -- and we have had some help, but we've not fulfilled it yet and that's all I'm just saying.

COMMISSIONER ASHBROOK: Okay, fine.

AMY ROGERS: The dream is unfulfilled --

COMMISSIONER ASHBROOK: Thank you.

AMY ROGERS: -- and yes, it does, and we thank you for your --

MAYOR PATTERSON: Well thank you for your time, Miss Amy. Thank you.

AMY ROGERS: Thank you. You're quite welcome, sir.

MAYOR PATTERSON: Come on up. Sign in please.

LISA MATTHEWS: I've signed in already.

MAYOR PATTERSON: All right.

I live at 312 Avenue F, and I think this whole setting is all a little bit much. I think that you commissioners with Mr. Anderson have done a little bit out of, out of concert, context, but I agree with Mr. Langston. I've only been back here since 2013, and I've seen things that are just outrageous. We have sent paperwork to Mr. Anderson that he hasn't responded to as far as the PAC, and he pushed

1 them aside. And we've got numerous phone calls 2 saying well where is the paperwork, where is the 3 rezoning paperwork, and they're sitting on Mr. Anderson's desk. So I'm saying we need someone 4 5 that's going to take our cause serious. We live there and sometimes it gets a little 6 7 bit hard to live there because of what I'm seeing, what I don't see what the need is and what's not 8 9 being generated in North Port St. Joe. 10 MAYOR PATTERSON: Thank you, ma'am. Yes, sir. BRIAN WAGNER: My name is Brian Wagner, 401 11 20th Street. Just trying to summarize everything 12 13 that's kind of going on is, with respect to Mr. 14 Langston what you said about first off being north side Port St. Joe, until the city can move on as 15 16 one --COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: And again I said 17 that --18 19 BRIAN WAGNER: I'm speaking. I understand what 20 you said. COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: I represent --21 22 BRIAN WAGNER: I understand what you said. 2.3 COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: Okay. BRIAN WAGNER: But Mr. Anderson works at the 24 25 pleasure of the commission, correct?

MAYOR PATTERSON: Sure.

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BRIAN WAGNER: So if there have been issues with things not being done that Mr. Jim is not doing, as we do this meeting, Mr. Jim has asked for a meeting to hear the accusations. As a citizen, I want to see documentation of where he did not do what you asked him to do and specifically things that, I can respect —

LISA MATTHEWS: Miss Matthews.

BRIAN WAGNER: I can respect what you're saying, yes, ma'am. I don't know if you remember me or not but --

LISA MATTHEWS: I remember him.

BRIAN WAGNER: -- I would like to see personally things that he has not done for his job, if that makes any sense. Because all -- I've come to two meetings, and all I ever hear each one of you guys get up there and say what, why you're doing this is for the people, and I'm doing this, I'm all for you, I'm here foy you, I want to do what you want to do, I represent everybody but there's no facts, and I need to see facts.

MAYOR PATTERSON: I gave you some.

LISA MATTHEWS: I didn't see them.

BRIAN WAGNER: I need to see facts so we can

make a decision and not just without cause, not Just willie nillie. I mean this is official, and I know Jim personally, and I'm coming into this as open minded as I can. I respect him just like I respect each and every one of you. I want to hear what he has to say just as much as I want to hear what you guys have to say.

So as we come to this next meeting, I hope you come with more than just emotions and feelings and thoughts, and I want to see facts where he has not done the things that you've asked him to do. Thank you.

MAYOR PATTERSON: Okay. Thank you, sir. Thank you. Come on up.

SAMUEL ANDERSON, SR.: My name's Samuel Warren Anderson, Sr. I live at 512 8th Street, Port St.

Joe, Florida. I was pretty much raised here.

Mr. Mayor, and every one of you commissioners,

I have all the respect for y'all. Do not get me

wrong. I'm here because the city administrator, no

matter where I live, but me living reasonably close

to the gentleman, you take a gentleman that, that

likes to hunt and fish, if he's a hard worker, which

he normally is if he does that because it takes

money to do that well, Mr. Jim, he likes making

things very pretty, beautiful, spending his time doing that.

When he's not at work and not with his family he's working on his house. Not 10:00, 11 o'clock in the morning, he drinks coffee at the crack of daylight and that gentleman is working. To me that tells me that when that man's at work, he's working just as hard. As leaders we should know this. As our main leader, Mr. Bo, you should know this. Fine example on this meeting.

I could get into it, and I could get hostile. Believe me I'm trying not to. The accusation that you said, and I rudely interrupted, and I very, I apologize for that.

MAYOR PATTERSON: That's all right. That's, all right, no problem.

SAMUEL ANDERSON, SR.: Because you probably really buried yourself.

MAYOR PATTERSON: Uh-huh.

SAMUEL ANDERSON, SR.: But for you to say that man pointed at you like that and said what you said, I know word for word sir, when sit down tonight and think about the way you started this meeting out, you need to think word for word for what you said about this gentleman. I've seen him hit his hand

1 with a hammer, squish his foot and somebody like me, 2 buddy, the good Lord don't want to hear what I have 3 to say. This man is, he plays with his children every 4 5 evening --6 LISA MATTHEWS: That's personal. That's not 7 jobs. 8 SAMUEL ANDERSON, SR.: -- every evening. 9 want to try end it right here saying if I lived 10 where I live, or if I lived in tim buck two, what I 11 know of that gentleman he never made them accusations. And -- and what did you say your memo 12 13 read? 14 MAYOR PATTERSON: The one that was supposed to 15 be on here was --16 SAMUEL ANDERSON, SR.: No, sir, what -- you 17 held it up. MAYOR PATTERSON: This one right here? 18 19 one right here says termination. 20 SAMUEL ANDERSON, SR.: You held it up. 21 MAYOR PATTERSON: This one says termination but 22 it's wrong. 23 SAMUEL ANDERSON, SR.: Termination for Bo Patterson? That's what you said ain't it? 24 25 UNIDENTIFIED: That's what you said.

SAMUEL ANDERSON, SR.: That's what you said.

MAYOR PATTERSON: That's not --

SAMUEL ANDERSON, SR.: And, sir, you see all these fine citizens --

MAYOR PATTERSON: I said Bo Patterson it would have said that.

SAMUEL ANDERSON, SR.: -- of this community it might be true. Thank you, sir.

MAYOR PATTERSON: Yes, sir, thank you. Thank you.

Come on up.

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JOHNNY LINTON: Johnny Linton, 2025 Marvin

Avenue. I want you to hear what I'm saying. I hung

out the door of a helicopter for two years, got shot

at every day all the time. It never, I never went

to a judge. I never to anybody else complaining

about it. I live with it.

This -- he didn't do anything wrong by saying something that was on his conscience. He just said it. And it, there's nothing we can do about that, but we live in a city that the water bill is so dad gum high you can't even drink the water. You can't bathe in the water. My water bill is 190, \$200 every stinking month, we got five, six, five commissioners up here, and they go on a trip every

month, go on it every year because I went. I was it's mayor. I was city commissioner.

MAYOR PATTERSON: I helped you. I campaigned for you.

JOHNNY LINTON: Okay, but I'm tell you right now, there better be some changes or there are going to be some changes. Either there's going -- we going to change -- Jim is the best man I've ever met in my life. He goes to my church. He's a Christian, he's a leader in the church. He's a really fine person. He's got a great family, and I'm going to tell you what, there's three or four of you here that won't be here next year if you mess with him.

MAYOR PATTERSON: Thank you, sir. (Applause from audience.)

BENNY ROBERTS: My name is Benny Roberts.

MAYOR PATTERSON: Hey, Mr. Benny.

BENNY ROBERTS: And I'm the historian in this building. I served three city manager, Charlie Brock three times, Alton Ferris one time so I'm talking about, I'm talking about 26 years of service I was a city commissioner. I worked for the city for five years straightening out the ball parks and running the recreation, so I've been in the city

hall 31 years so I -- I know about what went on and who went on with it you know.

So anyway, city managers became a problem.

Right, Mr. Mayor, Mr. Pate wanted a city manager so city managers had a lot more power in a sense than Charlie Brock. Charlie Brock was a, was the bookkeeper, and he's say right quick we ain't got the money. I mean he — if he didn't cut — he was tough. If we didn't have the money, we didn't do it. And when I left the city, we had three million dollars in Citizens Federal. In two years it was two million dollars in the hole.

You know people don't mind spending somebody else's money. It's easy to spend somebody else's money.

UNIDENTIFIED: That's right.

BENNY ROBERTS: But politicians are really kind of bad about spending somebody else's money because y'all -- and it doesn't matter if you have to borrow it. It don't matter. I mean the city -- what -- what have y'all got \$150,000, \$120,000 in debts you have to pay off for bad water bills? Y'all got that? Is that pretty correct? Is that pretty close? Yeah, pretty close. You paid off everybody. And did you ever think about this, the people that

have bad water bills that live at the beach don't live in the city of Port St. Joe, and when you take city tax dollars to subsidize somebody that don't pay his water bill, you taking my money to pay his water bill. You every think about that? You ought to think about it.

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Now this -- this situation has gotten out of hand, and I've only had three occasions to talk to this city -- city manager. Courteous, diligent, did what he said he was going to do, and then the next day it happened, you know. I couldn't not ask for any better service. And so all I'm saying is you might want to look at your own self.

And by the way, you was talking about North

Port St. Joe, when I was on that board, I went,

talked to the Northwest Government Development

Council, and the guy came to me and said Benny,

y'all wanting water and sewer, but I can get you

some money for recreation, and I said how much. He

said well we'll ask for 120,000, and we had just

traded the — the Northside, belonged to the school

board, we traded them for that baseball park over

there. We gave that to the school. So we traded

out. So then we had to tear our building down, but

we didn't have any money to fix it up, so this buy

came by, and he said hey, if you'll ask for a grant for that, you can get it because they on recreation this year. So I went back over there, he called me back. He said we're going to ask for 120,000. got the \$95,000. That was a grant that went to Northside that people it was, they never -- one of the candidates that ran said oh, we never got any grants over there. Yeah, you got 95,000. Then they turned around and told -- excuse me. MAYOR PATTERSON: No, sir, the three minutes up

on that.

BENNY ROBERTS: Okay. All right, next --MAYOR PATTERSON: The next in the aisle.

BENNY ROBERTS: Okay. All right, next -- all right, the next, next thing was we got another grant for 50,000. So we -- North Port St. Joe has been remembered, I promise you.

MAYOR PATTERSON: Has what?

BENNY ROBERTS: Been remembered as far as --

MAYOR PATTERSON: Walk over there and look.

BENNY ROBERTS: Yeah, walk over there --

MAYOR PATTERSON: See if it's been remembered.

BENNY ROBERTS: What?

MAYOR PATTERSON: I'll say it ain't been

remembered.

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1 BENNY ROBERTS: Well --2 MAYOR PATTERSON: You go over there and look at 3 it. BENNY ROBERTS: Well you know who's running it 4 5 now? Y'all threw it to the county. Amen, brother. 6 MAYOR PATTERSON: Right. Thank you, Mr. Ben. 7 Thank you, sir. UNIDENTIFIED: Hey, from where I growed up 8 9 North Port St. Joe, it is improving a great lot, and 10 that's the onliest thing I need to say. And it 11 comes from that man making things look --12 UNIDENTIFIED: You say it's improved? 13 UNIDENTIFIED: He's trying. It is --14 UNIDENTIFIED: Where you been at? 15 UNIDENTIFIED: It is improving. 16 You say you growed up here? I growed up here 17 too, my friend. 18 MAYOR PATTERSON: Gentlemen, please. NATHAN PETERS: Yes, sir, Mr. Mayor, you know 19 20 I'm retired now at the age of 69 years old. I've been a citizen of this community all my life, entire 21 22 69 years. I started participating in politics back in 1985 when I was first elected to city commission, 23 24 and I went on and became a county commissioner for

24 consecutive years. Now I do know something about

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politics and the way it works.

I want to say that from 1985 when I was elected to city commissioner, I had relationships with all the board members and all the people that worked for the city, and I knew all the way up to Jim, Jim came in. I believe it was in 2012, and he's been here about six years, that long.

Now I've had relationship with managers before him, and I had relationships with him his entire six years. I'm going to tell you something, and this is the God in heaven truth, I don't know a better person that we could have in that position than Jim. (Audience applause.)

He's been honest, and he's been supportive of my community. He can't do it, Langston, he can't.

You just got there. He can't do it that fast.

Government don't work that way.

MAYOR PATTERSON: I wasn't saying that it can happen --

NATHAN PETERS: Overnight.

COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: -- overnight. I was saying that throughout the years, and you -- you was a city commissioner. It's been a while. You were the county commissioner and pretty fine one.

NATHAN PETERS: Thank you.

1 COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: But the thing about it 2 is that we've been, these past 10 years we've just 3 been deprived. I mean, and the guy said that you 4 can go over there and look at it right now. 5 only thing that we got standing on MLK is your business. And I'm not saying that's bad. That's a 6 7 good thing because it makes people want to strive to 8 do better, but we need more things to come in to try 9 to help us --10 NATHAN PETERS: Yeah but Langston, you remember 11 when Avenue A was completely tore up --12 COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: Yes, sir. 13 NATHAN PETERS: -- and they put in a new sewer 14 system in that, on Avenue A all the way down. 15 COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: Yes, sir. 16 NATHAN PETERS: And then, and then we had 17 problems with the water. Not just North Port St. 18 Joe but all of Port St. Joe had problems with the 19 water. 20 COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: Right. 21 NATHAN PETERS: And they worked with us to get 22 that fixed. We got pretty good water now. 23 COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: Uh-huh. 24 NATHAN PETERS: You know what I'm saying?

it takes time to do that. But I'm here to say that

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Mr. Anderson, I don't know of a better person to have in that position, and I support him

100 percent. Thank you, gentlemen.

MAYOR PATTERSON: Thank you, sir. (Audience applause.)

TRAVIS BURGE: Mr. Mayor, Commissioners, I'm

Travis Burge. I live at 2011 Garrison Avenue, Port

St. Joe. Most of you know me. I've been here, I'm

telling on my age, but 60 years.

I just want to speak on behalf of Jim. I've been on the PDRB for two, maybe going on three years. Nothing but respect for Jim. Jim is a man of integrity. I've interacted with him on this board with issues, and he has brought nothing but integrity, and he has got the city's and the taxpayers of this community at heart in everything he does, and that's a fact. That's dealing with him straight.

Some of you know me, some don't. Rex Buzzett,
I appreciate the kind comments and the diplomatic
approach that he brought before you others. Pretty
obvious where the three votes are. And as I think
Brett you said earlier, the rumors and everything
else, well a little bit of that comes to light, son.
And I'm going to tell you something with each one of

you, Mr. Lowry, I've known you since you were little, you and your brother. You know that.

COMMISSIONER LOWRY: Uh-huh.

TRAVIS BURGE: I have a lot of respect, and Brett, I'm seeing a different pretty Brett, and I'll tell you, if your granddaddy was around, he'd roll over, son.

UNIDENTIFIED: Uh-huh, that's right.

TRAVIS BURGE: That is not diplomatic what you're doing. Mr. Buzzett has brought something to the table that was ignored. He made the motion anyway. Eric, I've known your mama back, used to work years ago, what, back in the '80s, good woman. I remember when you were in her arms, and I'm going to tell you something, son, search your heart. Do it a diplomatic way. Don't come in here and be led. I feel like you're led.

COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: No, I'm not being led.

TRAVIS BURGE: I really do, you know.

UNIDENTIFIED: He the next of the Langstons. Ain't no leading.

TRAVIS BURGE: Mr. Mayor, had the privilege of talking to you a couple of days ago. My dad called you, called me over there. We had our discussion, and in that discussion I told you what some of the

rumors were that I heard because I wanted to know.

I did not know. But we have a right as citizens,
everyone in this room that's here to represent Mr.

Anderson, and we're asking you to be diplomatic. Do
not let petty personality clashes, differences spoil
your ability as mayor. I think you've already done
that, but Bo, that's wrong. What you've told me
wasn't nothing but a personality clash.

Now isn't there -- well I understand there's a process, a diplomatic process that Mr. Buzzett has brought to the table, and it needs to be followed. You don't just come in and threaten a man to resign, if that's what's true, without any due process? It's ridiculous. And the people in this community are tired of it. Don't know what's in the background behind it, if there's any motivation. I heard there was.

Mr. Mayor, I mention to you those rumors and the fact that it, Mr. Lowery had approached Mr. Anderson is the story I heard, and in that story I said you know there's others that were mentioned behind Mr. Lowry with this, and you come out with a name. And I'm not going to, let's don't name drop --

COMMISSIONER LOWRY: -- uh-huh.

TRAVIS BURGE: -- but you pretty much in my opinion told on yourself when you brought that up when you named the name.

COMMISSIONER LOWRY: I'll talk to you. That issue --

TRAVIS BURGE: I didn't name the name.

COMMISSIONER LOWRY: Yeah.

TRAVIS BURGE: So what I, what I'd like to say just in closing, I challenge everyone of you, look at each other, search your soul, and one of you has initiated this. Somebody has. It took one. The smoke started by one of you and it went from there. So put it on the table instead of under the table is all I ask.

MAYOR PATTERSON: Thank you, sir. (Audience applause.)

GREG JOHNSON: Gentlemen, I'm James G. Greg

Johnson. I live at 128 Heritage Lane, Port St. Joe,

Florida. I had the privilege many years ago to

serve on this board and during that time I had the

privilege of working with Mr. Anderson. We had some

bad, bad economić times at that time. In fact I

remember one meeting where Mr. Weston and Mr.

Anderson and I sat down, we didn't know how we were

going to meet payroll in two years, or two weeks.

We worked hard. We called a special meeting. We got it resolved, but it was Mr. Anderson who led the charge and helped us understand where we were.

Since that time this man with his staff has created a positive balance in the city. I commend him for that, and y'all are crazy as heck if you run him off. He's the only one up there that has any idea what's going on, and if y'all lose this leadership, you going to be on a slope that's going to go downhill so fast a freight train couldn't stop it.

So I'm asking you to reconsider. Do like what some of the other speakers have said, talk to the man. If you have issues, work them out like a normal human being would do that runs a successful business.

This is a major business, and y'all are operating it like two kids with a baseball. I -- it's got to stop. It -- I had a very intelligent man one time tell me, Greg, don't ever criticize somebody in public. You criticize in private. You praise in public, but I can't do that with y'all today because I'm not happy with you. I -- I too believe that there's something going on behind the scenes that has caused this. Mr. Anderson has stepped on somebody's toes by telling them what the

charter says and what his marching orders adopted by y'all says do. I honestly believe that. And sometime since I got off this board y'all initiated a, an increase in your compensation to cover your cell phone usage. If I'm not mistaken, each of you get a stipend each month for your cell phone. Is that correct?

MAYOR PATTERSON: Sure.

GREG JOHNSON: Well today I'm formally requesting under the Florida Statute No. 10 Chapter 119 Section 11901 a copy of everyone of your cell phone bills from May -- April the 1st in 2011.

(Audience applause.)

MAYOR PATTERSON: All right let's hold it down please. Yes, ma'am?

LINDA TESHUTTI: I'm Linda Teshutti, Port St.
Joe, Florida.

First of all, we should have prayed because there's enough heat in here to start a fire, so we need Jesus. That's who we need, and all I have to say is that I've known this man since he was in second grade, but there is a lot of people that I know. I want everybody to deep inside dig in your heart. Ask God to watch over you because a lot of people are not right. If you do what's right in

your heart, we wouldn't be having this meeting today.

You people have got to change, myself as well. Get your heart right and stop doing favoritism for one and not the other one. Get it right with God.

MAYOR PATTERSON: Thank you, ma'am.

UNIDENTIFIED: Amen.

MAYOR PATTERSON: Yes, sir?

QUEN LAMB: My name is Quen Lamb. I live at (inaudible).

AUDIENCE: We can't hear.

MAYOR PATTERSON: Talk up a little bit.

QUEN LAMB: Quen Lamb, 1203 Palm Boulevard.

I at one time was director of People Helping
People program, and I had many opportunities to deal
with Jim in helping people with their — their fuel
bills, with food, et cetera. Not once did I ever
have a rejection by Jim or a problem with Jim
relative to bringing a citizen's problems to him.
He worked with me. He was cooperative. He was
understanding of the people's problems. As a matter
of fact, yesterday I went to the north side and got
some petitions signed in favor of supporting Jim,
and I don't know how many people remembered me and
said to me how wonderful Jim was in helping get the

problems solved. And he was absolutely understanding. I don't think we ever had an argument. We may had a disagreement on — on what figure to arrive at, but he was absolutely outstanding. And I would back that lady that just spoke before me that in my 82 years of living I cannot believe what I'm seeing or hearing this morning.

I have owned companies. I have run companies, large companies. Never, I hope never in my day would we have ever treated an employee as you people are treating Jim this morning. It's disgusting, and you need to really step back and take a look at yourself, but my support goes for Jim 100 percent. So thank you very much.

MAYOR PATTERSON: Thank you.

CHARLES GILBERT: Charles Gilbert, 118 Liberty Street. I'm here -- I'm not supporting, but I am supporting but the fact of it is I think we here for the wrong reason because the fact it shouldn't be about Jim. It should be about policies and procedures.

Now if we were going to have, and yeah I can say this, former employee of the city of Port St.

Joe running recreation department for a long time,

and, but policies and procedures if we had them in place, we wouldn't be here doing this today.

Because first of all, if you had a grievance with whoever then you got a grievance committee that it should have went through them to see if you had just cause even to be here today.

Now my thing is this, I'm also a preacher in this community. I've been one for over 32 years. I don't care what you say he said, because everybody got a story to tell, and everybody going to make their side look as best as they possibly can. But the fact of the matter is, I don't care who it is, everybody is due process of being fair. And you guys sit here, like I said you here to represent the people.

Now I will agree that I heard some stuff about the grants. Oh, I know a lot of grants done come, but I know that they went, they came in one area and then they went somewhere else to put pipes somewhere else and it was named something else. Yeah, I do know that too, but like I said, I'm not here for that today.

The city need to have -- do you have a policy in place how you deal with employees? Has anybody looked at his jacket? From what I heard, his jacket

is perfect. Did he get reprimanded any time? Did anybody write him up for insubordination?

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See what I'm saying? This what I'm saying, we -- we can, yeah, we can get a cause because I don't care who you are, if you can get enough people supporting you it will make a lot of people change their minds, but if you do things from your heart and your mind that when you go home at the end of the night, you can rest in peace. You're not going, you're not going to make everybody happy, but you know what you did when your heart was the best decision that you was making for the people, not because I'm mad at Mr. Langston, not because I'm mad at Mr. Bo. I'm not here for that. I'm here simply stating that the city need to have some type of policy in place so that they can deal with the employees.

What I'm seeing, and this is the way I feel, the city will work you all their, your life, and when the time for them to stand up for you, you ain't, you're out on a boat by yourself. So my thing is before you want to do what you're doing, I think we need to kind of regroup and look at the situation from your heart and see if it's justified. It may be. I don't know what happened. I'm not

going to get into you said he said, but it may be that he might need to be wrote up but why? Is it bad enough to terminate a man? This man — and I'm saying whoever, if they got a family, they got to feed people, and you get mad at me because I tell you or come up with or say something that you don't like, and you just get rid of me, that's — you know with I'm saying? Because I don't care who you are we're going to have some differences, and the most sacred place you can have is in the church, and you have differences there. So I don't care where you go you're going to have differences but it's the way you — it's all depending on how you handle your differences.

So, and like I said that's what I'm hearing.

I'm not seeing Mr. Anderson, I'm seeing the problem.

And this problem, if you do -- do it with him, you do with other employees, and you don't have a guideline, you're going to have this issue from time to time, but if you've got a guideline of procedure, they need to be followed and they need to be followed for everybody.

MAYOR PATTERSON: Thank you Charles.

SANUEL ANDERSON, JR.: I'm Samuel Anderson, Jr, 521 9th Street. I've lived here for 32 years, my

entire life, and Mr. Bo, I say with all respect, Mr. Bo, honestly I have some questions about you but that's not what we're here for. I'm going to comment toward you saying that Mr. Jim got hostile with you in the office per se.

MAYOR PATTERSON: Yes, sir.

SANUEL ANDERSON, JR.: I have a four-month old daughter that I love with all my heart. I would die for her. If I ever had to leave her with somebody outside of my family, Mr. Jim would be the first person I would leave them with. Do you think I would leave him, leave her with him knowing that he has a hostile mean attitude or anything like that? I don't think so. That's -- that's towards your reason why you feel like you're -- you're threatened by him. I wouldn't do that.

Brett, I -- I grew up watching you, you know high school. I wanted to be your friend, wanted to talk to you and everything else. I mean for you, for you to being up here on this board and for somebody in this audience to ask you a question, you got a I ain't got no response for right now, when you put that, when you put that name and that tag in front of you, you got to respond to us when we ask you a question. I'm sorry, that's part of the job.

Bo said it hisself, our code enforcement officer needs to find another job, well if you can't answer the questions that are brought to you, maybe you need to find another job. I hate that. I'm sorry but that's the way it is.

I mean, Mr. Langston, I understand completely where you're coming from. I've got plenty of friends over there. I'd do anything in the world for them. Love them to death, but it takes time.

And I understand where you're coming from but it takes time. It takes effort. It takes blood, sweat and tears and it will come. I promise you, it will come. All you got to do is work and be patient.

But Mr. Jim, he's a fine man. He works hard. I see it day in and day out. I'm around town all day every day five days a week.

Mr. Buzzett, he put a good thing on the, idea on there, everybody's talking about it. I don't think we've had one person come up here and say yeah, Mr. Jim needs to be gone because nobody believes it. If you've got a personal vendetta with him after hours, you need to pull him to the side and Mr. Jim, can I talk to you, and we'll hash this out like two grown men and not like a little kid in the candy, in the play, in the playground. That's

the way I feel about it.

Now he hasn't done his job, it's your job as his bosses to get rid of him, to come to him and say hey, I've been pulled off to the side on the my jobs plenty of times, hey, you need to work on your attitude. Hey, you need to work on your productivity, you know? Hey, they gave me a chance. Guess what, I heard it loud and clear. I kept my job. I'm going to keep my job just like Mr. Jim will and that's all I got to say about that.

MAYOR PATTERSON: Thank you.

BARB VANTRESE: My name's Barb Vantrese, 1311
McClellan Avenue, and I want to thank you
commissioners for having a meeting. I wish it
wasn't under these circumstances.

Bo, you have worked and helped me out with some problems, and I do appreciate that, but Mr. Anderson has come to my aid when I came to him with a sign problem for the Humane Society. We had to go through state. We had to go through city, and we had to go through county. He took me step by step for weeks to get this thing done because of his knowledge of what he needed, what I needed. I'd go to him, and he'd say no, Miss Barb, this isn't right. You've got to have it this a way, and I'd go

back and get it done, bring it to him. He is somebody that replacing him is going to almost be impossible for the knowledge that he has had for the years that he has served this community. Thank you. Thank you, Jim.

MAYOR PATTERSON: Thank you, ma'am.

STEVEN WOMACK: Good morning. I'd like to thank the -- the Star first for announcing this meeting in the paper. It wasn't on the city's web page on the -- it was not on the city's web page for an announcement on the city resources. I suppose the only way you would know about this is either through the -- the citizens' network or to go to the city hall and happen to see the flyer that you post so --

MAYOR PATTERSON: I don't know why it wasn't on the website.

STEVEN WOMACK: Well I -- I don't know either.

MAYOR PATTERSON: You know, we don't put it there.

STEVEN WOMACK: I know. There's a lot of stuff that's not on the web page that it should be, but that's -- that's not on topic so I'll leave that alone.

MAYOR PATTERSON: Sure.

1	STEVEN WOMACK: I'd like to thank the citizens.
2	You know, I my wife
3	MAYOR PATTERSON: Sir, you have to turn and
4	talk to us.
5	STEVEN WOMACK: Oh, yes, sir. Yes, sir. Oh,
6	no, I can't talk to them? No.
7	MAYOR PATTERSON: You address us.
8	STEVEN WOMACK: Yes, sir. Yes, sir. Well I'd
9	like to
10	MAYOR PATTERSON: But if you can talk loud
11	enough
12	STEVEN WOMACK: Yeah. I'd like to thank the
13	citizens for being here. I'd love to see this many
14	people here every other Tuesday night to see what
15	you're doing every single meeting.
16	Mr. Langston, at the last meeting you voted yes
17	for an \$8,000 paint job on the, on the locomotive.
18	COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: I think we all voted
19	yes.
20	STEVEN WOMACK: Yes.
21	COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: Okay
22	STEVEN WOMACK: So
23	COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: so what's the
24	problem?
25	STEVEN WOMACK: if well if you wanted to

1 help certain areas of Port St. Joe, namely to the 2 north, you might have voted no. 3 COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: Well if you was there 4 at the meeting, you -- you would --5 MAYOR PATTERSON: All right now. All right. 6 All right. 7 COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: -- you would have saw 8 where we got some beautification coming out MLK --9 STEVEN WOMACK: Absolutely, I was at that 10 meeting where the \$4,000 --11 COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: Well why didn't you 12 say -- why didn't you say, why didn't you say 13 anything about that? (Audience interruption. Mayor hitting gavel.) 14 15 STEVEN WOMACK: Well --MAYOR PATTERSON: Everybody be calm. 16 17 STEVEN WOMACK: -- because -- because 18 single-source contracts not bid out someone --19 everybody says yes to you, you say every --20 everybody says yes to everybody else. It's -- it's 21 a mutual admiration society up here and you're 22 saying yes to each other. 23 COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: Okay. STEVEN WOMACK: More specifically I'd like to 24 25 thank the press for being here. That's outside

standing because we want people to see what you're doing.

Mayor meeting with individual commissioners or city council members, if a mayor or a member of the council has a voice in the decision making through the power to break tie votes, meetings between the mayor and a member of the city council to discuss some matter come, which may come before the city council are subject to the Sunshine Law.

MAYOR PATTERSON: Uh-huh.

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STEVEN WOMACK: So when one or more of you, two of you get together outside of this meeting without that meeting being open to the public, that reasonable notice be given and that the minutes of the meeting are to be taken and promptly recorded then that's a violation of the Sunshine Law. As discussed by some of the other citizens present today, it seems or appears, and it may be hard to prove, that certain members of this board got together, I hate to use the word colluded, and decided that somebody had to go, and for what reason?

We've already acknowledged through the citizens present that Jim is a fantastic person. He's a great manager. My estimation of this is

1 specifically that he said no or is not onboard with 2 certain members of this board to spend certain 3 monies, and so you are going to get rid of him and put in a yes man who is going to then say yes to all 4 5 the monies that you're proposing to spend. there's at least three of you that have colluded and 6 7 have met and talked outside of the public, the 8 Sunshine Laws, in order to spend other people's 9 money, our money. And I can't prove it yet, but I'm 10 here to tell you, and these people know, the 11 motivation for all this is not Jim. It's not you, 12 it's money. Come back Tuesday. 13 (Audience applause.) 14 When's the next meeting? 15 MAYOR PATTERSON: Tuesday. 16 STEVEN WOMACK: Tuesday, what time? 17 MAYOR PATTERSON: Six. 18 STEVEN WOMACK: And I expect all of you to be 19 here to keep the, these people honest. 20 MAYOR PATTERSON: Thank you, sir. All right, 21 anyone else? 22 PHILLIP McCROAN: Mayor, commissioners --23 MAYOR PATTERSON: Yes, sir. 24 PHILLIP McCROAN: -- I served on this board for 25 four years. Bo, I served a many a meeting with you.

1	I'm going to tell you, Bo, what you're doing this
2	morning to this man is wrong. In four years that

PHILLIP McCROAN: Bo. Listen, Bo, this man -we had disagreements. Don't get me wrong. Me and
Jim had disagreements. We never agreed on
everything, but there was a point in time when the
city could not even pay its bills. This man
steadied the ship, Bo. He has financially managed
this city beyond belief, I'm telling you.

Buzzett. He knows what I'm talking about. This man has done a -- a yeoman's job. And for y'all to railroad this man like y'all -- Brett, I -- I don't know what to say, Brett. I am so disappointed right now. I sat in that seat where you're sitting. You have, you have thoroughly disappointed me this morning. And Eric, I'm going to tell you one thing, Jim Anderson does not make policy. Y'all make policy. What gets done, y'all drive the policy. And if there's projects to get done, y'all drive those policies. It's not up to Jim.

He's listening to five bosses and that's the tough -- hardest job any man will ever do, I'll

1 leave it at that. 2 MAYOR PATTERSON: Thank you, Phil. 3 (Audience applause.) 4 All right, does anyone else want to speak? 5 right, so where we at? MR. ALBRITTON: The only action item the 6 7 commission can take as I've previously said pursuant 8 to Section 34 at this time is there cannot be a 9 termination of employment. The only other action leaving is suspension. That's what Section 34 says. 10 Or adjournment, those are the only options. 11 COMMISSIONER BUZZETT: I want to instruct and 12 13 ask the board to not consider that option. 14 got a good man running the ship. Let's let him run 15 it and due process play out. COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: I think that we 16 17 shouldn't suspend him right now and let him stay in 18 the job he's in until he have his say in court or 19 whatever until we can discuss it any further. 20 MAYOR PATTERSON: Is that a motion? 21 COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: I'm talking right now. 1 I feel like we shouldn't suspend him right now. I'll make that a motion. 6 COMMISSIONER BUZZETT: Second. 7 MAYOR PATTERSON: All right, we've got a motion 8 on the floor, we got a second. Any discussion? 9 in favor say aye. 10 (All commissioners say aye.) 11 The motion carries five zero. I need a motion 12 to adjourn. 13 COMMISSIONER ASHBROOK: So move. 14 MAYOR PATTERSON: So moved. THE MAYOR: Ladies and gentlemen, before we get our meeting started tonight, I'd like to have the Chief of Police lead us in the Pledge of Allegiance, and I'd like to have Mr. Pat Floyd say the prayer for us.

(Whereupon the Pledge of Allegiance was recited by the audience members and prayer followed.)

THE MAYOR: I now call this meeting of the City of Port St. Joe City Commissioners to order.

COMMISSIONER LOWRY: Mr. Mayor, do you mind if I say something?

THE MAYOR: No, go ahead. Go ahead, Commissioner.

COMMISSIONER LOWRY: I just want to address the issue on Friday. This is coming from me personally in regards to Jim. And I'd like to read it to you.

I want to take the time to thank the citizens who are here tonight and were here on Friday, and those who are not here but show their love and commitment to this city on a daily basis. I can assure you that I take each and every issue before this city seriously. And I want the absolute best for the city. After having met with Mr. Anderson a few times after Friday's meeting, along with being able to spend the weekend to consider the input of

all who spoke, all that I have spoken to Friday, and would like to state at this time that I would not be in favor in terminating Mr. Anderson's contract.

And I will not be asking to schedule a formal hearing on this matter.

With that said, there are some items which Mr. Anderson and I are working through. I believe both Mr. Anderson and I can improve the long-term viability of the city by improving how we all work together. I will strive to effectively communicate the issues I have with the operations of the city with Mr. Anderson. And I believe after recent discussions, I feel very confident that we have found common ground in moving forward. I appreciate the hard work of Mr. Anderson. And I look forward to moving the city of Port St. Joe forward in a positive and productive manner. Thank you, Mayor.

COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: I'd like to say something myself.

THE MAYOR: Go ahead.

COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: I've had a chance to think about a lot of things. Over the weekend I went and talked with Jim, Mr. Anderson. We've been friends for a long time. We sat down and we talked for about 30 minutes. And I told him about some

goals that I wanted for north Port St. Joe. I believe he's committed to working with me to achieve those goals. And I'd like to say that I thank everyone for coming out. The things that you said, I really thought about them. It means a lot to me to be a voice for the entire city of Port St. Joe, but also north Port St. Joe. And I still -- I don't take back me saying that we've been deprived because it's real. I mean, if you ride over there and look at it, I mean -- but we have to be motivated. And I believe that if we continue to work together that that motivation will come. You know, it's just going to take some time and some hard work. And we've got some good people that's working over there real hard. So I just -- that's all I have to say.

THE MAYOR: I will piggyback onto that just to say that I know Mr. Anderson to be a fine husband and a fine man to his children. There's no doubt about it, he is. The problems we have have probably been personal, personal clashes that we had that weren't handled the right way by neither one of us. But I at this time do not want Jim Anderson to lose his job. I never did vote for him to lose his job. And tonight I say to Jim Anderson and to everybody in this audience, we need to move ahead, get past this

and work on City business. And that's all I've got to say about it.

COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: Can I say one more thing, Mr. Mayor?

THE MAYOR: Sure.

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COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: I'd like to take into account what Commissioner Buzzett said. Let's have a workshop and try to work some of these wrinkles out. I mean, let's put it out there and strive to work together. And let's have a workshop and try to work some things out and move on. I think that would be a good idea.

COMMISSIONER ASHBROOK: Absolutely,

Commissioner Langston, I think that -- Pastor

Gaithers (ph) I think spelled it out perfectly for

us. There has to be some kind of system in place

where we can let our staff know what we expect and be

able to follow up and make sure that that's

happening. And I do believe that we can work all

that out very easily by using other cities as a

model. So I look forward to that workshop.

THE MAYOR: Thank you, sir. Anyone else?

CITY ATTORNEY: Mayor, before you move forward,

I believe it was left last Friday, moving forward,

with the formal hearing that was requested by

Mr. Anderson. And it's been brought to my attention that's where we left off. So with that being said, if the Board's intention is not to have a formal hearing, I believe we should formulate that into the form of a motion, second and have the Board vote.

Which would be proper procedure based off of what my understanding of where the Board was left at on Friday.

THE MAYOR: All right. Could I get a motion by anyone?

COMMISSIONER ASHBROOK: So moved.

THE MAYOR: I have a motion from Commissioner Ashbrook. Do I have a second?

COMMISSIONER LOWRY: Second.

THE MAYOR: Second by Commissioner Lowry. All in favor say Aye.

THE BOARD: Aye.

THE MAYOR: Motion passes 5/0.

CITY MANAGER: I just want to thank the City

Commission today. We have had discussions. I've met
with Mr. Lowry, I've met with Mr. Langston. We've
had some good conversations. And for the betterment
of this community, we're all going to work together.

We're going to have some workshops. We're going to
come up with some formulations, some ideas so we can

1 do the will of the people of this town. So thank you 2 Commission. Thank you City of Port St. Joe. 3 THE BOARD: Thank you. THE MAYOR: All right. And we'll get to our 4 5 agenda. 6 Is there any room for discussion MR. WOMACK: 7 from the crowd about this, what just took place? THE MAYOR: Not at this point. We'll have crowd 8 9 discussion at the end of the meeting. 10 MR. WOMACK: All right. 11 THE MAYOR: Our regular Commission on 5/1/18, I 12 hope everyone had a chance to look over those 13 minutes. And I need an approval in a motion. 14 COMMISSIONER BUZZETT: So moved, Mayor. THE MAYOR: We have a motion from Commissioner 15 16 Buzzett. 17 COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: Second. 18 THE MAYOR: We have a second from Commissioner Langston. All in favor say Aye. 19 20 THE BOARD: Aye. 21 THE MAYOR: The motion carries 5/0. 22 Port St. Joe Redevelopment Agency. Bill, you 23 here? COMMISSIONER BUZZETT: He's not here. Nothing 24 25 further for the Board since the last meeting.

THE MAYOR: Nothing to report, okie-dokie. Moving right along to our City Attorney.

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CITY ATTORNEY: Yes, Mayor. Starting with the Florida Coastal Conservancy Agreement. Last month. Mayor, I had informed the Board that I would draft up a licensing agreement between the FLCC and the City of Port St. Joe, which I did and provided to the Board, which is in the agenda packet. It has been brought to my attention that the FLCC would rather go straight to the Department of Interior pursuant to the clause in the quitclaim deed. As of just prior to lunch today, the attorney for the FLCC provided me with a concession agreement, which is a form agreement that the Department provides in situations like this. At this time the licensing agreement which you have in your agenda packet, if they're not going to agree on, there's no point to vote on. that said, I think it would be prudent to follow what the deed restriction says in this and let's go to the Department of Interior and ask what they will approve. To do that we have to provide some framework of what the City is asking. We can't just say will you approve a lease. There needs to be some defined term specifically. The next big issue I believe would be for the maintenance and upkeep,

who's responsible where and when. Generally, the concession agreement that was provided just before lunch to me, I've made -- I reviewed it quickly and made a few changes. I think there are some other changes that could be made by myself. But I'm going to need some input from the Board. Because I can change some of the legal words and play lawyer on the document, but at the end of the day, I need to know some basics like term and who's responsible for what I would suggest to the Board that at this point there's really two options. One is the Board can give me at this time some feedback as to what to include in the concession agreement as far as term and responsibility for repairs and upkeep. We can provide that to the Department, agenda this item for the next regular meeting, come back. And if between that time there's -- the Board would like to see additions, corrections, deletions, I can send an amended request to the Department. The other alternative is that we table this issue, and the Board reviews the concession agreement as it stands now and allows me more time to review it myself and we come back next month. And at that time, hopefully, we'll have something ready in its final form for the Board. Ultimately, either way I'm going

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to need some direction as to lease term and responsibility for the maintenance and upkeep. And I'm not necessarily looking at the maintenance and upkeep as lightbulbs and air conditioner filters. I think everybody can agree that will be on the -- to use the laymen's term -- tenant here. But HVAC, other instrumentalities of that building, who's going to be responsible at what level. \$500 is a major repair, would that be the City's responsibility. And would the City be forced to make that repair. All those things need to be considered. And I have to have the Board tell me -- direct me on those issues. Once I have that direction, we can really go to either Option A or Option B as to where to take it from there.

THE MAYOR: What's the wishes of the Board?

COMMISSIONER ASHBROOK: Mr. Mayor, I'd be more

comfortable -- I just saw that concession agreement

myself around one o'clock this afternoon. And I

really haven't had time to dig into it. I'd be hard

pressed to make any decisions today. I think that we

should think about it until the next meeting. Let's

table it and put eyes on it and get more advice from

our attorney.

THE MAYOR: Do you want to put that in a motion?

COMMISSIONER ASHBROOK: I will put that in the form of a motion. Let's table this issue until next week.

COMMISSIONER BUZZETT: Second for discussion.

THE MAYOR: We've got a motion from Commissioner Ashbrook, a second from Commissioner Buzzett for discussion.

CITY ATTORNEY: Just for a point of reference, we don't have a meeting next week.

COMMISSIONER ASHBROOK: I'm sorry. Next meeting.

COMMISSIONER BUZZETT: Adam, with this motion do you still want input from us concerning the lease, the length of term, maintenance of, the type of agreement. Would you still like to get that from us tonight?

CITY ATTORNEY: Yes, Commissioner. There are a lot of things I can do just based off what's standard and what's in the best interest of the City. There are a few things that I just — I have to be informed by what the Board's desire and interests are. One of those would be the term. The other would be the maintenance and upkeep of the major items. So I would like some feedback. Obviously, that's up to the Board on how they want to pursue it going

forward. But until I know what to put in this agreement, I'm sure the Department is going to tell me that they're going to want to see some specifics.

COMMISSIONER BUZZETT: Exactly. And the lease agreement that you presented to us is basically 18 months commencing today I think. I made reference last meeting that I was comfortable with 12 months. I can get along with 18 months of the 60 days.

Basically everything in this lease, that's the way it's written. And I think it's \$500 for the upkeep and maintenance and also at our discretion.

CITY ATTORNEY: Correct, Commissioner. And when you're saying "lease," I presume you're referring to the license agreement, which --

COMMISSIONER BUZZETT: License, yeah.

CITY ATTORNEY: -- I provided. Yes.

COMMISSIONER BUZZETT: I think most people here tonight don't really know what's going on. But basically we can't lease any of the keepers quarters or Eglin. We can grant a license. Only the Department of Interior can — can grant that I think.

CITY ATTORNEY: The Department of Interior will have to approve of the usage if it's to sell, lease or sign.

COMMISSIONER BUZZETT: So that's -- I guess that

would be my two cents worth.

COMMISSIONER LOWRY: I'm fine with the 18 months as well. And I'm also fine with anything under \$500. Anything major would be on us, as you have it written, if everybody is fine with that.

COMMISSIONER BUZZETT: I'm fine is it.

COMMISSIONER ASHBROOK: My biggest fear, the reason why I'd like to table it, and you can probably answer it. My biggest question today, is there still an out. If we happen to get a call saying that the lens is ready and we need to ask them to leave, is that still an option?

CITY ATTORNEY: What I drafted the answer would be yes. The concession that I have currently, there is no explicit out that I saw. Again, I just got the agreement right before lunch today. So if I'm wrong please excuse me, but from what I saw "no" would be the answer to your question.

COMMISSIONER BUZZETT: I think really think we have to have that. Because the whole point of having that down there is to display that lens. So when they get the money to put it in there, we need to go forward with that.

COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: I've got a question. What if the lens hasn't got fixed after the $18\,$

months?

THE MAYOR: Is there a renewable clause?

COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: Yes.

THE MAYOR: Is there anything renewable in there about after the first 18 months, if the lens hasn't come in?

CITY ATTORNEY: Well, as of right now the concession agreement that I was provided doesn't have a term. But there is — there is no renewable language in there. But any contract can be — I mean, you can renew any — and again, to piggyback off Commissioner Buzzett, this is — essentially what we're working out is a lease. We can get into the legal technicalities and concessions and license. But essentially it's a right to use the property. And the Commission, certainly, at the end of the term could vote to extend it by however many months if there's a willing party that wants to be in that building, meaning the FLCC wants it extended.

COMMISSIONER ASHBROOK: Would we have to go back to the Department of Interior for that permission?

CITY ATTORNEY: I believe I would suggest to the commissioners that, you know, as long as the scope doesn't change, more than likely not. But that is a conversation I can have with the Department of

Interior, if the commissioners would so like.

COMMISSIONER LOWRY: I agree with that.

THE MAYOR: All right. We have a motion and a second. All in favor say Aye.

THE BOARD: Aye.

MS. SWINDALL: Excuse me. Can I just say a couple of things about that, about --

THE MAYOR: Yes, ma'am. Come on up.

MS. SWINDALL: Thank you.

THE MAYOR: We've already voted, but come on up.

MS. SWINDALL: I know. I just want to clarify some of the things because I don't think

Mr. Albritton is clear. We spoke with John Barrett,

(ph) who is the program manager for the Federal PERC and Land for the Southeast Region. He's the guy whose name is on all of those documents that were sent when the property was transferred to the City. And he provided us a template for a concession agreement. So it was basically just a fill in the blank, this is what you do if anyone wants to come in, any third party like a non-profit, like us, or a historical society or food vendor, anyone, if they want to operate in a structure like this, this is the

in the blanks. And there are probably a couple of

template to follow. So we went through and we filled

1 things that needs to be, you know, added in there. 2 And anytime any change has to be made to it, it does have to go back to Mr. Barrett's office for approval. 3 So we did get a lot of clarification by just going 4 5 straight to him. So I think that kind of erases some of the ambiguity of who can do what and what's what. 6 7 So we had a lot of clarity of that. So I just want 8 to say a couple of things about the term. Because we 9 will be in there fixing this stuff up, and we have to 10 consult with the State Historic Preservation Officer 11 for everything that we do in there. And knowing we 12 have a lots of far think only that. And knowing the pace that government moves, we -- I feel like a good 13 14 solid six months to fix the place up would be fair. 15 And then an 18 month operating period after that to operate as the Sea Turtle Center because we're going 16 17 to have to consult with this office and the state. We're going to try to get some grant money to do some things and fix that house up. And that's to the benefit of not only us, but the City. It's your building. It's our building. We're doing this for the city of Port St. Joe. And then ultimately, the Historical Society when they move in there. think it would be fair to have a six month fixer-upper period for the house and then followed by

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18 months afterwards to operate. and so, you know, I -- that's just kind of what we think about it. And then as far as the maintenance, he said \$500. We'd like to see that at 250. Maybe we can meet somewhere in the middle. Because it is an old building. it does belong to the City. And if we're in there -and at any given time something can go out and we have to put \$500 into it, and then you can kick us out next month, I just don't think that's very fair. So we're, you know, just -- those are the couple of things that I wanted to say about that when you're thinking about this. But, yeah, I think pretty, though, the format of this agreement has been set. Mr. Barrett's aware of, you know, that we're doing this here. And he's been -- he was very helpful and gave great guidance. And so I think we're on a path now to actually getting something in that house. It's been sitting empty for three years. So I just would like to keep the momentum going. Because it's going to be a great thing for the city really. you very much. I appreciate it. THE BOARD: Thank you. MS. SWINDALL: Thank you, Adam.

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AUDIENCE MEMBER: Can I say something, please?

THE MAYOR: All right.

THE MAYOR: Yes, ma'am, come on up.

AUDIENCE MEMBER: Thank you. Well, I came tonight on behalf of the Historical Society to approve the license that Adam had prepared.

THE MAYOR: Speak up a little bit. They can't hear you.

AUDIENCE MEMBER: I'm sorry. I had came on behalf of the Historical Society to put our backing behind the license agreement that Adam had so graciously worked out for us.

AUDIENCE MEMBER: You need to speak where folks can hear you.

THE MAYOR: Is that microphone working?

AUDIENCE MEMBER: Yes. Anyway, we agreed with the provisions of the license agreement that Adam worked up. I too have not had much time to look at the concession agreement. But there were a couple of things that kind of stuck out to me. And one of those was that they planned to open a giftshop. Now for those who may not be aware of the arrangement at the Lighthouse, the Historical Society runs the Lighthouse for the City. The Historical Society receives zero income from either the Lighthouse or the giftshop. The funds from those two places go back into the Lighthouse. We're going to have

another giftshop right next door to us that is going to impact the amount of funds that's going to be available. Now we've operated in the black for the last two years barely. But our agreement was that as long as we could operate it in the black, we would operate it. So I need you to be aware of that. we have competition for the dollars that come into that park as far as giftshop dollars are concerned, then we may have -- we may have some other issues. We mentioned that there was no provision for a notice I appreciate you bringing that up. not there. I believe that's appropriate in here. And, of course, we had estimated that it would take us about 18 months to raise the money to display the I would say to that we have a historic treasure there. Our lighthouse was the only light in the state of Florida that was intact, which meant the a lens was there, the mechanism, the clocking mechanism, everything was there. And we don't want to lose that obviously. So we will be working diligently to raise that money. So I would propose that perhaps we give them the 18 months. And then if we have not raised the money, then it would be renewable after that until such time as we have the money to do the display of the lens. But we really

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need that out clause. Thank you.

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THE MAYOR: Yes, ma'am. Please sign in for me.

MS. SWINDALL: So I'm going to cut into your sea turtle artwork sales?

AUDIENCE MEMBER: I'm sorry?

MS. SWINDALL: Is that going to cut into your sea turtle artwork sales?

AUDIENCE MEMBER: Excuse me. She has a question about sea shell -- sea turtle artwork. We were donated artwork by a local lady who gives her artwork to non-profit organizations for them to make money. It just so happens some of them were turtle pictures. I have not sold a one of them. But, yes, I do have them because they were donated to us as a non-profit.

THE MAYOR: All right. Thank you, ma'am.

Yes, sir, Mr. Pat. Come on up.

MR. FLOYD: Thank you.

Thank you for the opportunity to address you again on this. And I like the attitude of reasoning together that you've already started and exhibited quite some time with this commission. It certainly is a good hallmark. I think you can see that the historical society has approached this in the spirit of compromise. They were the ones who really were given the right to occupy and facilitate both of

these buildings, including the Eglin building. they have said, look, that's okay. I mean, the Florida Coastal had a part of the Sleeping Beauty They allowed that. And now I think what you've seen is increasing demands by Florida Coastal to the point that now -- and I think you should look at this carefully. They have unilaterally gone straight to the Department of Interior to talk with them and deal with them about this issue without your authority or input or that of the Historical Society. And that is something that you need to really keep in mind at the forefront. If somebody does that, that kind of evidences a reckless disregard for the very thing that we're trying to talk about here, the lens. This lens is on loan. And the grant has specific application requirements. If you end up going to these people without the City and without the Historical Society, and then you generate some type of controversy over there, we may all lose it. We may lose the lens as well as the other grants that were there. So what is the thing to look at to reason together about. First thing is, you need to tell these people, Florida Coastal, not to do anything without the City or without the Historical Society. Because you don't know what's

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said and you don't know how it's going to be reacted And the red flag that I think you need to look at first is they -- is that Florida Coastal submitted a lease, but it did not have anything in there but about being terminated or complying with the requirements of the application grant or the So that should be something to cue you on what's happening there. Then we get down to the next thing, this concession agreement. Like I said, they go unilaterally to them. But the concession agreement doesn't have the 60 days in there noticed that you specifically said would be in there before. And now there are additional items that are being requested. And that's what I'm calling as sliding negotiations, where you get something you think, and then you keep on going with it. And that's what I see looks like is happening here. What's problematic about it really is this too, is you get somebody that's a bull in the china closet -- well, maybe it's really here a turtle in the china closet, and you have them disregard the particular interest of those other people and go straight to it, you may generate a controversy there that you can't stop. And that's why I'm saying, these people from the Historical Society, I say we on the Historical

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Society have made compromises to try to make sure that there's a place for the people at Florida Coastal in a reasonable and gentle way of doing this. Now what I suggest -- what do you suggest? Well, I suggest that the particular lease that's come up with -- excuse me. The license agreement that's come up with by Mr. Albritton, that that be utilized and be voted on as the template for us to go to if we have to to the Department of Interior. And I think it's already been suggested we probably won't have to do that. Isn't that the best way? Let's don't look the gift horse in the mouth and go over there and start complaining and having problems and controversy. Let's get it set as to what we want to have. And what you have, your attorney has recommended, is come back. It's got the 60 days in It's got the 18 months that they compromised I suggest you go ahead and do that in the interest of reason and the interest of the lens and the lighthouse. And then we won't have to go and talk with Goliath over there and risk losing the lens and the lighthouse. Thank you.

THE BOARD: Thank you.

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THE MAYOR: Pat, would you sign in, please?

MR. FLOYD: Yes, I will.

THE MAYOR: Don't forget, people, if you come up, please sign in. All right. We had a motion and a second, we've already voted. So what's next?

Are you through, Mr. Adam?

CITY ATTORNEY: As for that issue, Major.

THE MAYOR: All right.

CITY ATTORNEY: As to the RG Kay Investments land lease wherein the City of Port St. Joe wishes to lease land from RG Kay Investments, I think this one is much easier. We have a lease agreement that I have previously provided to the City, which I am in agreement and so is RG Kay, alias Mr. Kerrigan. The one outstanding issue is that Mr. Kerrigan has asked, or his representative has asked that before final execution of the least that he see the anticipated press release that will be issued by the City. I've spoken with Mr. Anderson about this and Mr. Anderson did not seem to think that would be an issue. Correct, Mr. Anderson?

CITY MANAGER: Yes, sir.

COMMISSIONER ASHBROOK: Adam, what was the most recent change that was made to this? I've been following this, but there's been quite a few back and forths.

CITY ATTORNEY: Yes, sir. If you look at

Article 15.1, and you go down closer to the bottom, you'll see language referring to the recording of the right of first refusal. This will put third parties on notice that the City has this right of first refusal. If there's a title search, the title company should see it. Absent doing that, you know, we could have a situation where a good-faith buyer purchased the land and it's not the buyer's issue. It's just easier to put it in public records. There's no question as to the existence. That's the only substantial change in here. I did clean up a couple of typos and things like that, but it did not change or alter the substance or terms of the lease.

COMMISSIONER ASHBROOK: So this was a change in our favor, in the City's favor?

CITY ATTORNEY: Correct. Correct.

COMMISSIONER ASHBROOK: Okay.

CITY ATTORNEY: And a change I had asked for.

COMMISSIONER ASHBROOK: Okay.

COMMISSIONER BUZZETT: I applaud Mr. Kerrigan for offering this property to us for a dollar a year for 30 years. It would be a great addition to Reed Avenue to have some nice restroom facilities right in the middle of town. He's a St. Joe High graduate, St. Joe person. He loves Port St. Joe. And I

1 appreciate his offer. And with that I make a motion 2 to approve the lease as presented. 3 THE MAYOR: All right. We have a motion from 4 Commissioner Buzzett. Do we have a second? 5 COMMISSIONER ASHBROOK: Second. 6 THE MAYOR: Second by Commissioner Ashbrook. 7 All in favor say aye. 8 THE BOARD: Aye. 9 THE MAYOR: Motion carries 5/0. Is that all we 10 have for us Mr. Attorney? 11 CITY ATTORNEY: Yes, sir, that's all I have at 12 this time. 13 THE MAYOR: All right. Jim? 14 CITY MANAGER: Yes, sir, Mayor. The first item 15 of business tonight under old business is the road bond money. We have went out to bid for the 16 17 materials for the downtown area and for Long Avenue. 18 We suspect those should come in on the 25th. In our 19 previous meeting we did go ahead and schedule the 20 special meeting for the 31st at twelve o'clock for the Board to review all of our options and to move 21 22 forward on expending the road bond money. 23 THE MAYOR: Sounds good. Sounds good. 24 right.

COMMISSIONER LANGSTON:

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THE MAYOR: Sure.

COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: I was called by a citizen on Avenue G back there, I think Dab Dawson, right there in front of his driveway, it's like built up kind of high and people have been tripping over it and falling down. A few people have been to the hospital. He said -- he was kind of upset. He said he was going to send the City the bill. And I told him that I'd speak with the other commissioners and see if we could get something done. John Reckon (ph) called me and told me that he had an idea to temporarily fix it. But he wanted -- I wanted to get with the other commissioners. He wanted to get with the other commissioners and get with the City engineer to see what we need to do. But I also think that that road there needs to be paved if we have any extra money from the road bond. It's a short street. It's not a long street, it's a short street. probably not even a block long. I just wanted to put that -- get that to commissioners and let's think about it. But John did say he could fix it temporarily. So I think that that would be a good idea for now.

CITY MANAGER: Commissioner Langston, that is

one we have talked at the staff level. And we are going to have some numbers for you when we come to that meeting on the 31st to fix that issue on Avenue G. So, yes, sir, that will be one option that you could, if you wanted to forward on that.

Mr. Smallwood will be back in the office next week.

We're going to have him formulate some numbers for us on that. It will be an option for us.

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COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: Okay. Thank you, sir.

THE MAYOR: All right. What else we got, Jim.

CITY MANAGER: The next item under old business is the fire truck purchase. We did table this at our last meeting. Commissioner Lowry wanted to see if we could come up with some options to pay for it with cash instead of financing it. What we have, Mayor, is the total expenditure is about \$354,507.72. would include the firetruck, the equipment and a new jaws of life. We've looked at trying to see what we have on hand as far as paying for it in cash. Unfortunately, don't have a lot of options in the general fund. We have our BP money that we've been using for different items on there, as a option on there. Going up on ad valorem taxes, I don't know if that's something anybody wants to address on there. Hopefully our ad valorem numbers are going to go up

this year. But we don't have those in hand yet.

What I would suggest is that if it's the will of the
Board to go ahead -- if we feel we need a new
firetruck, let's work it through the budget process.

Based on the contract -- I gave a copy of the
contract to the City Attorney to review. But from
what I've seen on there, correct me if I'm wrong,

Mr. Attorney, we don't have to pay anything for a
full year thr-- or 300 days. So that gives us time
to work through our options on that. But it's up to
the Board to feel -- if you feel it's worthy of us
replacing the 1992 firetruck.

THE MAYOR: We definitely need to replace it, don't we, John?

JOHN: Yes, sir, you do.

THE MAYOR: We don't have a choice, I don't think.

JOHN: Not unless you're going to tie up a lot of money in an old firetruck.

THE MAYOR: And did you tell me the price we got is only good up till tomorrow or something?

JOHN: Tomorrow morning. The chasse itself would go up to 3 to 4 percent in the morning.

COMMISSIONER LOWRY: John, the game plan is to also sell that other truck too and recoup --

JOHN: Yes, sir.

COMMISSIONER LOWRY: I mean, that's positive.

THE MAYOR: I think the County might have some interest in purchasing the old truck. Some of the people I've talked to said they would entertain the idea of buying it if the price is right. So we may be able to sell it just like Commissioner Lowry said. We've got to have to it. There's no choice. We've got to be able to put out fires in the way they should be put out. And I feel like with what we've got now, we're in jeopardy of not being able to do that at some point in time. So I don't want to lose no lives because we don't have a firetruck that's capable of taking care of any fire we may have.

JOHN: Yes, sir.

THE MAYOR: So that's where I'm at at this thing. I'm ready to do whatever we need to do to order this truck.

COMMISSIONER ASHBROOK: And, Mr. Mayor, it's not just a public safety issue as well. That's the big one. But we risk our ISO rating dropping as well. Which could raise every bodies property insurance on new builds. So that's another thing to think about too. It could cost the citizens if we don't act.

THE MAYOR:

COMMISSIONER BUZZETT: So let's move forward, 1 2 Major. And let the staff work out the --COMMISSIONER LOWRY: I'm fine with Jim's 3 recommendation. I make a motion to move forward with 4 5 the purchase. THE MAYOR: I have a motion from Commissioner --6 7 I can't even think of your name, Mr. Lowry, Commissioner Lowry. 8 COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: I second. 9 10 THE MAYOR: I have a second from Commissioner -what's your name? 11 COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: Langston. 12 THE MAYOR: I know what your name is. All 13 right, we've got a first and second. It's good to 14 have a little laughter sometimes, people. I tell 15 you. We have a first and a second. All in favor say 16 17 Aye. 18 THE BOARD: Aye. THE MAYOR: Likewise signed, Motion carries 5/0. 19 John, you're getting you a new truck, son. 20 JOHN: Thank you, sir. 21 THE MAYOR: Thank you. We appreciate everything 22 you do for the City. 23 Thank you, sir. 24 JOHN: 25 CITY MANAGER: Onto new business. The first

1 item, Mayor --2 COMMISSIONER BUZZETT: Whoa, whoa, whoa. 3 was for the truck. What about the equipment? 4 THE MAYOR: Equipment, we've got to do the 5 equipment. 6 CITY MANAGER: Yes, sir, I would recommend the 7 equipment also. The equipment -- the truck itself is 324,930. The equipment is \$21,777.72. And you 8 also -- there is a sole source item on there for the 9 10 jaws of life equipment on there. That is 7,800. 11 the total for everything, Mayor, is \$354,507.72, 12 total package. COMMISSIONER BUZZETT: Move your bid for the 13 equipment. 14 We have a motion from Commissioner 15 THE MAYOR: Buzzett. Do we have a second? 16 COMMISSIONER ASHBROOK: Second. 17 THE MAYOR: Second from Commissioner Ashbrook. 18 19 All in favor say Aye. THE BOARD: 20 Aye. The motions carries 5/0. 21 THE MAYOR: 22 CITY MANAGER: What about the actual sole source 23 for the jaws of life equipment? Can we get a motion for that? 24 25 THE MAYOR: It's got to be separate?

CITY MANAGER: I think so. It would probably be 1 2 appropriate, Mayor, since that was not bid out. 3 THE MAYOR: All right. Can we get a motion for that? 4 COMMISSIONER ASHBROOK: So moved. 5 THE MAYOR: So moved by Commissioner Ashbrook. 6 7 Do we have a second? COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: I second. 8 THE MAYOR: Second by Commissioner Eric 9 10 Langston. All in favor say Aye. 11 THE BOARD: Aye. 12 THE MAYOR: Motion passes 5/0. COMMISSIONER ASHBROOK: Takes a lot of work to 13 14 buy a truck. THE MAYOR: I tell you. 15 CITY MANAGER: Moving on to new business. 16 the item we have is the north Port St. Joe PAC 17 workshop. To my understanding, the plan has been 18 submitted to the redevelopment agency. 19 redevelopment agency has reviewed it. And it's 20 appropriate at this time to set a workshop for the 21 City Commission to review. 22 THE MAYOR: Okay. We need to do this I think 23 when Mr. John Henry is in town. Do you want to come 24 25 up a minute?

COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: Well, I think the City
Planning Consultant, we need to get him on here too.

John, he can be -- I guess, he can be on conference
call or whatever. But we need to get the city
planning consultant here on that date whenever we set
it up.

COMMISSIONER BUZZETT: The gentleman that took
Maria Pennington's place?

THE MAYOR: I agree. Jim, you'll take care of that?

CITY MANAGER: Do we have a range of dated,

Mayor? Is there a couple of dates that y'all want to

try to come up --

THE MAYOR: Sometime in June, maybe the middle of June, Chester?

MR. DAVIS: Yeah, we want to try to do it as quickly as possible. And I want to say based upon the fact that this started about two and a half years ago. And we submitted a plan to the City, the CRA and City then approved. We developed a CDC, and it's been approved. And we're set. Now to do some great things in our community. As a matter of fact, Commissioner Langston has put it to the floor very prophetically that we need to do something for north Port St. Joe. For the last ten, twelve, thirteen

years, nothing has been done. So we now have submitted to the City a plan that's dealing with rezoning that's very beneficial for the shareholders in that area so that we can increase property value and bring in business to that community. thing I wanted to add to that, Major and to the Commission is this, one of the problems that we have is when people don't come and share with the city commission meeting and with the PAC meeting and the CDC meetings about what's going on in the community, it gets to be a split thing with the community simply because people are not there to know what's going on. And I'm asking that now we inform our callers that come with dividing statements that, you know, they come to the meetings and find out what's going on. Because so often what's happens, is they get by words or they get things that are said on the side. need to come and see what we're requesting for the City. And they need to be part of the meetings so that when they come and call the mayor and say, you know, got certain people running the commission or running the floor over there, and they're not knowledge about what's going on. We need to make sure the public knows exactly what we're doing. And with the rezoning thing that we have out there now,

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it's very profitable not only to north Port St. Joe, but it's for the city of Port St. Joe. So we're hoping that when people come that we invite them to come not only to the city commission, but to the CRA meetings and also to the PAC meetings that we're having so that they can be informed and know exactly what we're doing in north Port St. Joe. I think we have a viable process going on now. And we're looking forward to some great things in the future. I think Eric has been very valuable to us now in talking about what we need to do. We just need people to come and support it.

THE MAYOR: Thank you. What dates you got for this workshop?

MR. DAVIS: Well, we need to set that up with Eric. Because one of the problem is, we need the city consultant there. So we need to get with the City to find out what date the consultant can be there. And we will have John Henry there just as a person that can make a statement as to, you know, what the rezoning really requires. But we need the city consultant there to tell us exactly, you know, what the City can do and what they cannot do to make that rezoning. Because it's a lot of increase in density.

CITY MANAGER: Commissioner Langston, if you'll get with me, we'll give a call and see if we can set up a couple of days. And we can get with Mr. Davis and make that happen.

COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: Okay.

THE MAYOR: Okay, sounds great.

MR. DAVIS: And right now our next meeting is Saturday at eleven o'clock at Philadelphia Primitive Baptist Church. Thank you.

THE MAYOR: Thank you, Chester Davis.

CITY MANAGER: All right, the next item we have, Mayor, is in reference to the fishing piers at Clifford Sims Park. Mayor, they're starting to show their age. We've looked at them, we've worked on them. The guys have tried to keep them piecemealed together for the last couple of years. They're well received by the community. It's time they need a little TLC. What staff would like to do is ask permission to go out and get some CAD drawings to formulate what we think can be done to make some repairs out there. We're probably looking at, you know, 1,000, \$2,000 to do that. We have money put aside. We're receiving the money coming in from the Fishing Express for the rental. You have about \$25,000 in that fund. So the first step, we would;

like to get permission to do that, and then bring that back to you so we can formulate some bids to get these things repaired.

THE MAYOR: All right.

COMMISSIONER LOWRY: I'm fine with that.

commissioner Buzzett: I'd like to throw something out. We've got two piers down there. We have to maintain two piers. I've talked to some of the guys who fish down there, and 90 percent of them use that one central pier that comes off from the restroom facility. I'd like us to consider, of course, demolishing both of them, rebuild the one in the center, but a little larger, a little nicer. We'd only have one pier to maintain. And so that was just —

COMMISSIONER ASHBROOK: And demolish the two?

COMMISSIONER BUZZETT: Yeah. And just come back with one a little bit larger and nicer, of course.

We'd only have one to maintain at that time instead of two.

THE MAYOR: We're going to keep the area down there where the gazebo is, right?

COMMISSIONER BUZZETT: Definitely. But the two piers, I would say, consolidate into one real nice one. It might save us some money.

1 MR. EDEN: Since you mentioned it, I've got a 2 question about that pier. THE MAYOR: Just a minute. 3 MR. EDEN: Can I ask a question? 4 5 THE MAYOR: Just a minute, yes, sir. MR. EDEN: Just wanted to ask a question, that's 6 7 all. THE MAYOR: Okay. Are you putting that into a 8 9 motion? COMMISSIONER BUZZETT: No. I'd just like to --10 if we do CAD drawing maybe have a choice. 11 12 THE MAYOR: We have a motion on the floor from Commissioner Lowry, right? 13 COMMISSIONER LOWRY: Well, I'll withdraw my 14 Because that was just for the original pier. 15 THE MAYOR: All right. 16 COMMISSIONER BUZZETT: I can make a form motion, 17 yeah. I'll make a form motion we just construct one 18 19 pier in the center at the restroom facility at Clifford Sims Park, and that would be it. 20 THE MAYOR: We have motion from Commissioner 21 Buzzett. Do we have a second? 22 COMMISSIONER LOWRY: I'll second. Second for 23 discussion. And my only discussion point is, as long 24 as we can perform that task within our -- what we 25

have saved up currently.

COMMISSIONER BUZZETT: I agree. I can -- I'll incorporate that in my motion.

COMMISSIONER LOWRY: I'll second stance it.

THE MAYOR: Any discussion? Mr. Eden, was that you? Come on up.

COMMISSIONER LOWRY: While he's coming up, this is just for the CAD drawings, though, right?

CITY MANAGER: Yes, that's it. We have no idea what the cost -- we need to go back to you and go out to bid for it. Once you look at the drawings and you think it's appropriate, then we'll go out to bid for it.

THE MAYOR: Okay.

MR. EDEN: I just had a question for you. I happen to be down in that area where he's talking about the pier for the last -- I've been down there twice in about a month. And we used to have an open container -- we had an open container law down there. You couldn't drink on either one of those.

Well, I was down there day before yesterday and the pier on the far left was -- had a bunch of hooligans. They were probably anywhere from 18 to 25. And they were all drunk and they were running those people off from there. They couldn't fish. The people that

were trying to fish had to go down on the bottom with little kids. I mean, they were -- excuse the expression. They were raising hell. And something -- we didn't used to let the people do that, you know.

THE MAYOR: Did you call the police and tell them?

MR. EDEN: No, I didn't bother to call. They're supposed to check. You know, that's what you pay them for.

AUDIENCE MEMBER: Amen.

THE MAYOR: I agree. I agree.

MR. EDEN: I mean, we had people to go down -we had to run people off from there when we first put
that up. We had to get the message across. It ain't
a drinking lounge.

THE MAYOR: Right.

MR. EDEN: You know, it's a place where people are supposed to fish and bring their kids. Well, they had everybody out there running. They had to actually get off — get out and go down and get down on that little link with small kids. There was one about that high.

THE MAYOR: That's not right.

MR. EDEN: They couldn't get on there. So I

just wondered if we still had the open container. I know we eliminated a lot of areas. I don't know if that area is --

THE MAYOR: Jim, is that one of the areas that no alcohol is allowed, open container?

CITY MANAGER: No, sir, you're not allowed to have an open container there. You have to have --

MR. EDEN: Well, all I'm asking is please enforce it, okay? Thank you.

THE MAYOR: Chief, you'll take care of that for us, won't you?

CHIEF HERRING: Yes, sir.

THE MAYOR: All right.

reference to the food distribution center for the summer at the Centennial Building. Currently the food distribution center is handled by the Workforce Board on Mondays at the Washington gym out of the Wick building. It's been well received by this community. I would recommend that we do allow for the Workforce Board to utilize the Centennial Building. All in favor say Aye. 16 THE BOARD: Aye. 17 THE MAYOR: The motion carries 5/0. CITY MANAGER: The next item we have is in 18 19 reference to scallop restoration. There's a program 20 going on now to -- where you can actually -- I believe you can actually adopt a cage, can't you --21 22 COMMISSIONER LOWRY: Yeah. 23 CITY MANAGER: -- Commissioner Lowry, where you can actually help out with the restoration of the 24 25 scallop program. I'll let Mr. Lowry -- I'll turn it

over to him. But I think it's a really good program that's got quite a bit of movement going on in the community.

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COMMISSIONER LOWRY: I spoke to Jim about this last week. I had an individual approach me that is involved, and a couple of other their friends are involved with the FWD Scallop Restoration Caging Project. Those three individuals are residents of Bay County. They use -- they go out on Mexico Beach, but they also put in at our boat ramp downtown. And what their request was to have a waiver of the fee, of a permanent fee, if they showed prove that they're involved in that restoration project. But I would make sure -- I don't expect many. But I thought I would bring it to the Board and see what you guys thought about it. But again, I don't anticipate many at all.

COMMISSIONER BUZZETT: You go through FWC and get some kind of license? Or how do you go about getting one?

COMMISSIONER LOWRY: I imagine there's some type -- and I made a phone call but didn't get an answer today. There's got to be some kind of certification they have to go through to even -- or some kind of badge or something they give them to

1 check them. Because they can't just go out there and touch those cages. So we to get written proof before 2 3 we would issue a permit free of charge. CITY MANAGER: And I think we could -- on our 4 5 permits on there, we could do some kind of 6 distinguishing mark on those if they showed the proof on there and attach it to the actual permit itself if 7 8 it's the wish of the Board. 9 COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: I think it's a good 10 idea. COMMISSIONER BUZZETT: I have no issues with 11 12 that. COMMISSIONER LOWRY: All right. I'll make the 13 motion. 14 THE MAYOR: All right. We've got a motion from 15 16 Commissioner Lowry. Do we have a second? 17 COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: I second it. 18 THE MAYOR: Second from Commissioner Langston. 19 All in favor say Aye. 20 THE BOARD: Aye. THE MAYOR: Motion carries 5/0. 21 22 CITY MANAGER: The last item we have in reference to golf carts. Mayor Patterson wanted to 23 talk to you tonight about them. 24 25 THE MAYOR: Somebody is going to get killed on

the golf carts. The reason they're going to get killed is that people don't know the rules and they don't care to know the rules. We've had one golf cart accident about a couple of weeks ago. Luckily no one was hurt seriously. Sunday I was sitting at the red light at First Street on 98, here comes a golf cart across. It's legal crossing. I swear the kid driving that golf cart couldn't have been more than 13 years old. So I want to propose that we set up a golf cart workshop. And everyone that has a golf cart needs to attend. And we need to make sure everybody knows the rules. First of all, you're not supposed to be on Garrison, long or Monument except to a next street where you can turn off. rules. You're supposed to travel the other streets up and then go across. And I've seen people in offices cross at the wrong place on 71. I mean, so it's not just regular people. It's people -- other people too. It's just -- I tell you, somebody is going to get killed. And I don't want that on my hands, not nobody's young baby get killed with a golf So I think we need to have a workshop whenever we can get it set up and we go over the rules of having a golf cart. And I want to maybe injunction in some inspections periodically on golf carts.

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don't know if three years, five years, whatever we can come up with. But we need to make sure that the golf carts are operating properly. They have all the things on them that they need to have. Because this can get serious. This can get real serious.

AUDIENCE MEMBER: If you're coming down

AUDIENCE MEMBER: If you're coming down

Garrison, Long or Monument, you've got to get out of
the way because people do 60 and 70 down Garrison,

Long and Monument. Am I right or not?

AUDIENCE MEMBER: You're right.

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THE MAYOR: I don't know. I mean --

AUDIENCE MEMBER: I see them do it all the time. Nobody stops for people.

THE MAYOR: Right. The way I understand the rules of the golf cart is you should be on either Woodward, Marvin or Palm. Those are three I know of. You can take them most of the way all the way up, and then you can cut over and go where you're supposed to cross at there at 71 right there by --

MS. ROGERS: You've got to enforce the rules.

AUDIENCE MEMBER: You're going to have to have an ongoing process of --

MS. ROGERS: If you don't enforce the rules --

AUDIENCE MEMBER: -- training people.

AUDIENCE MEMBER: -- they're not -- and that's

the thing.

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THE MAYOR: Exactly. We need a training session. That's what I say, we need --

AUDIENCE MEMBER: Well, no, it's going to have to be ongoing because some people will buy one and hadn't gone to this workshop and they'll need to go to a -- I think you should just institute some kind of a license that they have -- or a permit that they have to get.

THE MAYOR: Would you please come up. Please come up. Sign in, if you will.

an initial permit they have to go through a training workshop. And then people that buy a golf cart subsequently, they would of course need to go through that procedure. Because if you just have a workshop now, you're going to train everybody that's got one. And then people are going to come in later that will not have gone through the workshop. And, then, you know, you'll have the problem all over again. It will gradually come back as people acquire — you have new purchasers. So my advice is to make some money at this thing.

THE MAYOR: What would we do about --

AUDIENCE MEMBER: Give a permit. We pay for

permits for out cars and so forth.

THE MAYOR: Right.

AUDIENCE MEMBER: But get them some training to let them know what it is. We have a lot of folks that come down here, and they acquire a golf cart. They think this is the beach, you know, rules don't apply, you know, it's just carefree. But, you know, it's not the case. You know, we need to think about this.

COMMISSIONER BUZZETT: Jim, what's the normal process when someone comes in for a permit?

CITY MANAGER: Basically what they do is they come in and get the application processed. Then they have to actually have it inspected by the police department. Sounds like what we may need to, it sounds like we need a combination of things. You know, I think we probably need to have an inspection process every so often, whether it's a year or two years, Mayor. And you may want to tag onto that a safety course. You know, the folks when they come in and they get in inspected and everything, if they have to do a 30 minute safety course with the police department, they could go over the equipment and tell them the rules and make sure everything is done properly.

1 THE MAYOR: I think that would work great, Jim. 2 I do. I think that's what we need to do. MS. ROGERS: If they're under 16 they should not 3 be able to drive a golf cart. 4 THE MAYOR: Come up front. I can't -- we can't 5 6 hear you. 7 MS. ROGERS: Under years of age they should --THE MAYOR: Wait, wait until you get up front. 8 MS. ROGERS: -- not be able to drive a golf 9 10 cart. 11 THE MAYOR: You have to be 16 years old and have a permit. 12 13 MS. ROGERS: That's right. THE MAYOR: Or you can a learner's permit and 14 have somebody in the car with you. 15 MS. ROGERS: Right, to drive a golf cart. 16 17 THE MAYOR: Right. MS. ROGERS: And if you don't enforce the rules, 18 then, it doesn't do any good to have rules. We lived 19 in a golf cart community in Georgia, and there was 20 never any problems. We had an auditorium where there 21 were always big concerts. And everybody took the 22 23 golf carts to the concerts because it was a lot easier than taking a vehicle. 24 25 THE MAYOR: Sure.

1 MS. ROGERS: And there was never any problems. 2 But you have to set rules and you have to abide by If you are under 16 and you are caught without 3 an adult, then the adult is responsible for that 4 5 child. 6 THE MAYOR: Exactly. MS. ROGERS: And if you're an adult and you 7 drive intoxicated or whatever the case is, you pay 8 9 the price just like you're driving a vehicle. It's that simple. 10 THE MAYOR: Yes, ma'am. I agree with you be. 11 12 The golf cart, it's a privilege. MS. ROGERS: That's right. 13 THE MAYOR: And people need to --14 MS. ROGERS: And if you're on the wrong road 15 and -- I'm sorry, if you can't read the signs, then 16 17 you pay the price. 18 THE MAYOR: I agree. Thank you for your 19 comments. MR. RICH: After the process, are there rules 20 21 that the police or somebody gives them? THE MAYOR: Come on up, sir. 22 23 MS. ROGERS: You get a ticket just like a 2.4 vehicle. If and when you get -- buy the CHIEF HERRING: 25

golf cart, you go through the process, the City comes inspects it and all, is there a set of rules that they are given?

THE MAYOR: Yes. They should be given a set of rules.

CITY MANAGER: Mayor, if you like, what we can do is we can go back and look at our golf cart ordinance. We can bring back to you some type of mechanism that you can look at, if you want to go forward with an inspection process and a safety course, something you maybe could add it to. I'll get with the City Attorney and see if that's something y'all want to add into it.

THE MAYOR: Jim, I think that would be wonderful, man. Like I said, I don't want no child or no adult to get killed on a golf cart.

CITY MANAGER: We'll have something for you at the next meeting.

THE MAYOR: Okay, thank you.

COMMISSIONER BUZZETT: Mayor, while we're on that, we still have problems with the walking path, vehicles on our walking path.

THE MAYOR: I've seen golf carts on it.

COMMISSIONER BUZZETT: Yes. Especially in the ballpark area. And there are a lot of children

running up and down there. But one of the worst things happening right now in that area, from Eighth to Tenth Street on walking path are vehicles. I saw a lady last night drive from Eighth Street to Tenth Street in her car on the walking path.

THE MAYOR: I've seen them in pickup trucks.

COMMISSIONER BUZZETT: We need to put those delineators back up on Eighth and Tenth Street side.

I mean, yeah, you want to drive in there and see your youngun play ball. But, I mean, you walk farther than that when you go to Walmart. So park where you should park.

THE MAYOR: I agree.

COMMISSIONER BUZZETT: So I think along with this I'd like -- right now it says authorized vehicles only. I think we need to change the sign to say no motorized vehicles, and that way -- because folks think, well, my kid has got a ballgame, I should -- I can drive in here. So I'd like to see us change those signs to motorized vehicle -- no motorized vehicles allowed.

THE MAYOR: I don't have a problem with that.

COMMISSIONER BUZZETT: And then if the police

find folks doing it, then they --

THE MAYOR: We hate to give tickets, but we have

1 to sometimes. COMMISSIONER BUZZETT: They do what they should 2 3 do. COMMISSIONER LOWRY: What about the individuals that own the houses along that stretch, aren't they 5 6 allowed access back there? CITY MANAGER: There is a provision in there for 7 those folks. That was part of it when it was put 8 9 together, that we did say the people that do live 10 directly behind there, they do have the right -- to be safe. But they do have a right to get to the back 11 12 of their property. 13 THE MAYOR: So I guess it would have to say --COMMISSIONER BUZZETT: That's a small exception. 14 COMMISSIONER LOWRY: Yes. 15 16 COMMISSIONER BUZZETT: A half dozen house, 17 that's it. CITY MANAGER: We'll move forward on getting 18 something to you the next meeting. 19 THE MAYOR: Yes, sir. 20 COMMISSIONER LOWRY: We just need to make sure 2.1 that we delineate them, those particular ones. 22 CITY MANAGER: Absolutely, yes, sir. If we come 23 across those folks, we'll let the police department 24

know those folks are allowed to do that.

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THE MAYOR: What did we decide on our golf cart workshop? Are you going to get us one set up, Jim?

CITY MANAGER: We can. We can have a workshop, or I can have something to you the next meeting.

However you want to do it, Mayor.

THE MAYOR: That's fine. Just bring it to us at the next meeting.

CITY MANAGER: Okay, we'll do it.

THE MAYOR: Thank you, sir.

CITY MANAGER: Mayor, Mr. Grant is not here tonight. His son is actually playing in a pretty big baseball game tonight starting in just a minute. So go Sharks. But if you would like an update for the Public Works, I can give you what we have on that.

THE MAYOR: Okay. Jim, go ahead and do that for us.

CITY MANAGER: Yes, sir. We work in flushing, preparing for the summer season, precautionary boil water. What we're doing is not boil water. But actually what we're doing is we're trying to make sure the waterline is as clean as possible for the summer months. So we are out there flushing the lines in the beaches area, all the way through to Overstreet. We did a code red yesterday to let people know that we are doing that to -- as routine

maintenance.

THE MAYOR: All right.

CITY MANAGER: The second item we have is the Highway 98 from Avenue A through D waterline replacement. That is part of the water management district grant for \$85,000. We will be wrapping that up in the next two to three weeks. That will complete that phase of the water replacement project.

THE MAYOR: Good deal.

CITY MANAGER: And then the last item, we're going to roll back once we get through with those two items, we're going to roll into the Jones Homestead sewer. That's the \$250,000 legislative appropriation we got for sewer installation at Jones Homestead. So we are moving forward on that very quickly.

THE MAYOR: Good deal. All right, is that it on Public Works, Jim?

CITY MANAGER: Yes, sir, that's all we have tonight.

THE MAYOR: All right. Surface water. Larry.

MR. MCCLAMA: Mr. Mayor, I don't have an update for the Board. But I'll answer any questions you have.

THE MAYOR: Anybody have any questions for Larry.

COMMISSIONER ASHBROOK: Just a comment. 1 Larry, 2 I got your e-mail. Those tanks look awesome. You 3 guys did a good job. 4 MR. MCCLAMA: Thank you. That's it, Larry? 5 THE MAYOR: MR. MCCLAMA: Yes, sir. 6 7 THE MAYOR: All right. Mr. Mike LaCour. MR. LACOUR: We have confirmed with our auditor. 8 We are expecting to receive our completed audited 9 10 financial statements for prior year by the end of the 11 month. So we're hopeful that that comes through. THE MAYOR: All right. Anybody have any 12 questions for Mike? Find us some money, man. 13 COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: Did you look into the 14 money that we need to get down -- to go down MLK? 15 MR. LACOUR: I'm sorry. The money we need --16 COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: The beautification 17 that --18 19 MR. LACOUR: Oh, the beautification, yes. 20 Haven't we worked that out with John on the beautification? 21 I believe that was approved 22 CITY MANAGER: Yes. by the Board to use up to \$5,000 of BP funds, if I'm 23 not mistaken. So I believe that was approved. 24 COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: Did we go with the BP 25

fund? I thought they were going to try to find 1 2 some --COMMISSIONER BUZZETT: You might be right. 3 think we did BP on the train. 4 THE MAYOR: We did BP on the train for sure. 5 COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: He said he was going to 6 7 look through the budget to see if he could find any money besides -- because we didn't want to pinch off 8 9 that BP money. THE MAYOR: 10 Right. CITY MANAGER: We can find \$5,000 for --11 COMMISSIONER BUZZETT: Yeah, I think just move 12 13 forward on it. THE MAYOR: All right. 14 15 COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: Good. COMMISSIONER LOWRY: Mike, have y'all talked 16 17 about when start budget? MR. LACOUR: We put together a timeline. 18 19 don't think I've given it to Jim for his review. 20 then we'll push that out to you here in the next few weeks. But we have started that process internally, 21 22 yes. CITY MANAGER: We're starting at staff level, 23 Commissioner Lowry. If y'all have things -- if you 24 want to come and sit down with any of us at any time, 25

please do it. Generally we try to wait until the election is over with, that way we have a full Board. And then we start the full review with the Board itself. But at any point in time, we're always working on budget stuff so, yeah, come see us.

MR. LACOUR: Yeah, certainly if you have ideas for budget, please bring them up so we can start a list. And we have started a list to try to make sure we catch everything that needs to be looked at.

THE MAYOR: Okay. Wastewater.

MR. PETTIS: We're pretty much the same place we were the last few weeks — or actually a couple of months, or a month and a half now as far as the level of the pond. Two tenths of an inch of rain today didn't really do justice to the pond. You know, the pond is just too big for that. So we're going to not spray this month. We'll pick it up next month and spray in June. So we discharge out in June. It will probably take all the —

THE MAYOR: You know, my biggest fear because we're coming into the summertime, if we don't spray and keep it low, people in Highland View are not going to be to stand it. It will take your breath over there in Highland View when that stuff gets on top of that water. You can't hardly breathe. I

mean, I've been over there. And we had some upset residents over that way because of that. So I just hate we can't spray. I wish we could. But if we can't, we can't. And maybe we won't have the algae blooms that we've been getting. But I just hate to see it come.

MR. PETTIS: Yeah, the discharge in the spraying will slow down the algae. I mean the nutrition is always going to be there in the bottom of the pond. That's what we've got to get rid of, that nutrition. You know, we've got to at least help it as far as cleaning the pond, the bottom of the bond.

THE MAYOR: Are our sonic boomers working, or whatever?

MR. PETTIS: Yeah. I've got one that's out right now. So I've went out to see what I can get to replace it. They're about 4,000 each, 5,000. You know, they're in that range. So it's not a — they're not as cheap as you would hope they would be. So I've got five out of six working. And I'm waiting for the rest of the guys to come back and tell me if they can do me any good on the pricing. But if we sprayed now, we wouldn't be able to get more than six inches of water off the top of the pond anyway. We've got it down more than four feet. So we've got

20 there. And we're only past 16 foot deep. 1 2 THE MAYOR: Have we got approval yet on the sand 3 from the DEP? MR. PETTIS: Working with that. Talked to Kadee 4 5 Yates. And so --THE MAYOR: When are they going to be sampling 6 7 it I guess and let us know. How long of a period are 8 we talking about? MR. PETTIS: We're kind of hoping -- we're kind 9 of hoping not. I met with the Saint Joe corporation, 10 and we've got a spot of sand that they think should 11 12 be fine. Which may be enough to get us what we need. So it will be just the diesel fuel and the labor to 13 move it and spread it. 14 THE MAYOR: Right. 15 MR. PETTIS: Waiting on Kadee to make sure that 16 she agrees with St. Joe Corporation, you know, that 17 it's clear. 18 THE MAYOR: Everything is fine, okay. 19 MR. PETTIS: We're already set up. Just waiting 20 on DEP to let us know. 21 All right. Anybody have any THE MAYOR: 22 questions for Kevin? Do you have anything else? 23 MR. PETTIS: That's all I've got. Thank you. 2.4 THE MAYOR: All right. Thank you. What about 25

the City Engineer?

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CITY MANAGER: He's not here with us tonight, Mayor.

THE MAYOR: Okay. I didn't see him. I didn't want to skip him.

COMMISSIONER BUZZETT: Mayor, if you will, it might an appropriate time under City Engineer that I've been working with Clay on the Tenth Street Ballpark Renovation that the County is working with us on. I passed out to each of you tonight a -- the most recent drawing that we're planning to present. I would like if you guys would take it home and study The next meeting if everything looks on here to you, I'd like to put it on the agenda for a vote and we can take it to the County and say this is what we They've already offered to -- you know, that fifth penny any of the bed tax to fund it. So we can get started on engineering once we've got a plan. that's -- Clay has done a great job again. after -- I think after we approve it, we can put it on our website for everybody. But until then I think we just need to try to work it out among ourselves. And then we'll put it out and go from there.

THE MAYOR: I agree, I certainly do. All right, code enforce, I guess everybody has been looking at

1 the stuff that you sent --2 MS. BEBEE: Can I make one little request? 3 THE MAYOR: Ma'am? 4 MS. BEBEE: Could I make a comment, a request? 5 I think it's probably a great improvement over what we had before. But we got into trouble before 6 7 because nobody saw it but you before it was voted on and was going to be acted on. I would ask that you 8 9 put it on the website before you vote on it and let 10 there be public comment. I don't have no problem with that. 11 THE MAYOR: 12 COMMISSIONER BUZZETT: Oh, by the way, Ms. Charlotte has got several copies of this latest 13 mockup for a few folks that would like to have one. 14 You have a few extra, don't you? 15 16 MS. PIERCE: Yes, sir. COMMISSIONER BUZZETT: Okay. And then also if 17 we can put it on the website, Jim. 18 19 CITY MANAGER: We'll get it on there. 20 COMMISSIONER BUZZETT: If you can do that before 21 the next meeting. THE MAYOR: All right. Police department. 22 23 CHIEF HERRING: I don't have anything, Mayor, unless the Board has questions for me. 24 25 THE MAYOR: Y'all have anything for the Chief?

Anybody have anything for the Chief? All right, Ms. City Clerk.

MS. PIERCE: Everything is in process for the election runoff. We're working with the supervisor of elections, Mr. Handlin. And everything is on go with that.

THE MAYOR: Okay. Is that all, Ms. Charlotte?

MS. PIERCE: Yes, sir.

THE MAYOR: Thank you very much. Okay, at this time we'll go to citizens to be heard. That will be a three minute limit and please, please, please be courteous to each other. Yes, sir.

AUDIENCE MEMBER: It will just be easier for me to pick this up. Last Friday, I see that you guys are trying to work things out. I think that's good. But I think it's naive and unwise to just try to paper over this. A man just about lost his job that day. And I went back over the video and all y'all both — and Mr. Patterson and Mr. Lowry both mentioned — Mr. Lowry, you mentioned getting text and e-mails that were upsetting. I think it was on Thursday. I never what — what was those about? What was the — it was some incident that sounded like it happened on Wednesday that all of a sudden your phone blew up on Thursday.

COMMISSIONER LOWRY: I'm not personally going to 1 2 get into that. MR. EDEN: You're not? 3 It's -- it's --COMMISSIONER LOWRY: 4 But that was the reason for your 5 MR. EDEN: decision to ask for his termination? 6 7 COMMISSIONER LOWRY: No, sir. MR. EDEN: Oh, that wasn't? 8 COMMISSIONER LOWRY: It's a dead issue in my --9 MR. EDEN: Oh, it's not dead. 10 COMMISSIONER LOWRY: To me personally --11 MR. EDEN: You guys almost -- do you know what 12 you almost did to this man's family, all three of 13 you. Also, you want to come up acting like tonight 14 like nothing happened. 15 COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: No, we ain't acting like 16 17 nothing happened. THE MAYOR: No, nobody's doing that. 18 COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: We said we were going to 19 have a workshop to try to deal with thing and bring 20 it out into a discussion. That's what we've said. 21 You can come to the workshop. 22 MR. EDEN: What is the thing? What is the 23 thing? What is the thing about him? You said --24 25 COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: What do you mean "what

is the thing"? 1 MR. EDEN: You said --2 3 COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: I said we're going to get things out in the open. We'll see what the thing 4 is at the workshop. 5 MR. EDEN: You're not going to tell us 6 beforehand? 7 8 COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: What you talking about? 9 MR. EDEN: The cause. The cause that you used to make a motion for termination without cause. 10 seconded it. And we don't -- you don't want to tell 11 12 us. COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: I don't have anything to 13 hide. 14 15 MR. EDEN: You don't? COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: I told you what my 16 17 reasons were --MR. EDEN: Your three things. 18 COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: -- that day. If you 19 can't remember that, I'm sorry, I'm not going 20 backwards. We're moving forward with this. 21 MR. ECHOLS: I know you want to. 22 COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: We are. 23 MR. EDEN: You mentioned that he didn't -- he 24 wouldn't rezone MLK. 25

Do you remember the other two things,

Mr. Anderson, that were his causes for saying you

did not do it?

CITY MANAGER: Mr. Echols, at this point I'm trying to work with the City Commission over here to move forward.

MR. ECHOLS: It's been told to me that those three things are actually your jobs, not his. He would be breaking the law if he did what you were holding against him. So I mean — so you want to fire him for not doing your job, for not breaking the law. Now do y'all realize this man almost lost his job. In a little town, it's hard to replace that. I want y'all to think about that. You started the meeting off by saying that this meeting is not about the termination of Jim Anderson. I don't know who did that. But somebody misconstrued what you said.

THE MAYOR: Your three minutes is up. I'm sorry.

MR. ECHOLS: It didn't take 30 seconds for you to prove that you were lying about that. Because that's what the meeting was about. You read from notes. You were prepared. What did somebody tell you to prepare for.

COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: Is three minutes up yet?

THE MAYOR: Chief.

MR. ECHOLS: Give me the hug when it gets tough, right?

THE MAYOR: He needs to get away from the podium. Be courteous and nice. Thank you, sir.

MR. ECHOLS: Bo got to go. Recall vote.

THE MAYOR: Yeah, that's right.

MR. ECHOLS: That's right.

THE MAYOR: All right. Anyone else? Raise your hand. Come on up, Johnny.

MR. LINTON: Johnny Linton. I just want to say that I appreciate what you did tonight. And I don't if we would have done it unless we had all these people behind us last week on Friday. I think it would have been a different situation.

AUDIENCE MEMBER: Amen.

MR. LINTON: I think Jim would have lost his job. But I'm not going into that now. I just want to tell you, I was on the commission for ten years. Commissioner, Mayor and I was privileged to service them. Bill Wood, Charles Norton, Bennie Roberts, Greg Johnson, Damon McNair, Nathan Peters and Rex Buzzett. I just wanted to tell you tonight, Rex how long have you been on this commission?

COMMISSIONER BUZZETT: Ten.

MR. LINTON: How many?

COMMISSIONER BUZZETT: Ten years.

MR. LINTON: Rex is probably -- if I had to pick one commissioner that I wanted to be with me on my commission for the lifetime, Rex Buzzett would be one of them. And I just want to tell you that I really appreciate you, Rex. If you'd stand up, I'd like to give you a -- come on.

(Audience clapping.)

MR. LINTON: I just think Rex is -- his dad encouraged me to run for office when I ran. And that was back in the old days. But I certainly appreciate everything you've done, Rex. Thank you very much.

THE MAYOR: Thank you, Johnny

Yes, sir, come on.

MR. WALL: Gentlemen, I'm opening a new business in town. And I've been there every day for two months observing everything going on on the corner of 3rd and 98, and I'm very concerned. In the morning we have people who are cooks and servers and clerks and business owners who pull their cars in front of our business, all up and down and stay eight, ten hours without moving them. Our customers have no place to park. And in other areas I've been in, usually you — one way to solve it is a three hour

limit, and somebody -- you know, you can't park all day. But we're spending a lot of money to put in a business. A businessman here has closed his parking lot across the street from us. We can't park there anymore. So I just would like to ask that we consider something, I don't know what. But I mean, but something to try keep our employees and our business owners from tying up every parking place we've got for ten, twelve hours a day. And our customers don't know where to park. And I just ask that you consider that.

THE MAYOR: Yes, sir. We have been working on it. It's a progress and process, you know. But we have been addressing it. And I agree with you. Some merchants are terrible. We have some terrible merchants in this town because they won't make their employees park nowhere else. I make mine park down there by Mark Costin's.

MR. WALL: Well, another thing, is some of them are even now parking in the non-parking places. I had a man today, and the truck couldn't get the alley. He had to go knocking on doors to get somebody to move his truck out of the way at his tattoo parlor. Anyhow, I'm not saying who it was. But anyhow, I mean he was parked in a non-parking

place blocking the alley. So I think people ought to 1 2 watch out a little. And I called the police 3 department, and an hour later his truck was still there. And so, you know, whatever caused that. 5 Thank you. I appreciate it very much, gentlemen. THE MAYOR: Yes, sir. Anyone else? 6 All right, Mr. Buzzett, we'll go to you tonight 7 first. 8 COMMISSIONER BUZZETT: Well, you've --9 THE MAYOR: We got one, okay. Come on. 10 11 didn't see your hand. My bad. 12 MR. ROGERS: No doubt you didn't see me. You didn't know when the meeting was yesterday. 13 THE MAYOR: Yesterday, what are you talking 14 about? 15 MR. ROGERS: When you told my wife you didn't 16 know when the meeting was when she asked you when the 17 18 meeting was. THE MAYOR: I didn't tell your wife that, sir. 19 20 I offered to come pick up trash out of your yard myself. 21 MR. ROGERS: That's right. 22 23 THE MAYOR: Myself come to your yard because --MR. RICH: But she asked you --24 THE MAYOR: -- children had put trash in your 25

1 yard. MR. LINTON: She asked you -- she asked you on 2 3 the phone when the next meeting was, and you told her 4 you didn't know. 5 THE MAYOR: Sir, I never said that. Do you have 6 a recording? 7 MR. ROGERS: Well, either you --8 THE MAYOR: Do you have a recording? MR. ROGERS: -- or my wife lied. One of you. 9 10 THE MAYOR: I'm sorry. Your wife called me and 11 asked -- told me there was children playing and messing up her banana trees. I told her we were 12 13 going to try to get a sign built to put in her yard 14 to say do not go in this yard, and I would come 15 personally and pick up your trash for you. 16 MR. ROGERS: Yeah, you did say --17 THE MAYOR: But she called me back and said there wasn't but a little bit and y'all had picked it 18 19 up. MR. ROGERS: You did say that. 20 So I don't understand. 21 THE MAYOR: 22 But you told her you didn't --MR. ROGERS: AUDIENCE MEMBER: That's personal. We need to 23 24 get on with the meeting.

Yes, we do. I mean, I was trying to

THE MAYOR:

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help your family by doing everything I can to make sure those kids stay out of your yard. You know I am.

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MR. ROGERS: All right. The City is looking at two potential serious problems. The first problem is, the pedestrian crossways. Apparently people in this town do not understand that the state of Florida gives the right-of-way to the pedestrian. And people blow through those pedestrian crossways like they mad. They crazy. I mean, if you're walking down that path and you get to the pedestrian crossway, you better -- I mean, there is a stop sign there. But the pedestrian has the right-of-way, not the car. The car should have the stop sign. And that is a state law. I saw a kid almost get hit on his bicycle. People jammed on their brakes to keep from hitting him.

THE MAYOR: Yes, sir.

MR. ROGERS: That is one serious problem that needs to be corrected. The other serious problem is, your ball field that you're fixing to build, the infield is going into people's backyards. And according to you, you said the City don't have money put a fence up. So therefore, you are putting — if there's some kid playing in the person's backyard or

the person is in their backyard grilling and the ball field kid, hopefully gets him a good home run over the field and it goes into somebody's backyard and hits them, you're opening yourself up for a liable suit because you have no protection to stop the balls from going into people's backyards.

THE MAYOR: I know on the other side over there where the 11 and 12 year olds play, there's a fence over there in people's backyard. And when we hit balls over there -- I remember when I used to coach, they wouldn't give us our balls back, they just kept them.

MR. ROGERS: Well, I find a lot of -- I find the balls in my backyard when I hit with my lawn mower.

THE MAYOR: Yes, sir.

MR. ROGERS: All you've got to do is look at that right there and count from Eighth Street down. And Eighth Street is where the kid almost got run over on his bicycle.

THE MAYOR: Right.

MR. ROGERS: I mean...

THE MAYOR: I have asked John Grantlin to bill -- get me a price on a sign that would say please do not enter per the City -- in your yard per the City of Port St. Joe.

MR. ROGERS: I know my three minutes are up.

But I don't care if a kid come and gets his ball out

of the yard. What I don't like is the kid coming in

my yard and peeing. My yard is not a bathroom.

They've got bathrooms there.

THE MAYOR: Yes, sir.

CITY MANAGER: Mayor, can we suggest that when start moving this plan forward to the committee that maybe we can look at putting a fence in there to see -- that's one of the options we can look at in there to see.

THE MAYOR: Yes. We may be able to afford it. The City can't.

CITY MANAGER: We may or may not be able to do it, but that's something we can look at?

THE MAYOR: I don't remember how much John Grantlin told me it was. But it was a lot of money.

CITY MANAGER: So that may be something we can utilize when we put this plan together in there. If that's something we need to do to move forward and make this thing work for the community, why don't we try to do that.

MR. ROGERS: If you're going to build a complex in a housing area, there should be a barrier to prevent balls from going into somebody else's yard.

Just like if you're driving down the highway and -now this is in Panama City, so I know it's different.
But they've got the driving range over there right
down the side of the road.

THE MAYOR: All right, sir. And I hear everything you're saying. I really do.

MR. ROGERS: And they've got a barrier so people can't slap a ball out across there and hit somebody's car, you know, and cause an accident.

THE MAYOR: Yes, sir. And I will work on trying to solve y'all's problems. I've already told your wife. I met with her and told her. She called me on the phone, I talked with her on the phone and told her what I would try to do. I even offered to come get the trash out of your yard.

MR. ROGERS: Yeah, I know. I already picked the trash up.

THE MAYOR: I know. Because she called me back and told me not to worry about it, y'all had already picked it up. She said, but please try to help us. And I said, I certainly will. And that's what I'm going to try to do is help you.

MR. RICH: Trying has run out a long time ago.

THE MAYOR: Okay. Sir, your three minutes is

up.

MR. ROGERS: Thank you.

THE MAYOR: Yes, sir. Thank you.

MR. ROGERS: Everybody's time runs out when you get tired of listening to your problem. Some kid gets hit on their bicycle, it's going to be nobody's fault but y'all's, or whoever is in charge of controlling the road.

THE MAYOR: Yes, sir.

MR. WOMACK: Good evening. I know there's a baseball this evening. I had some prepared notes.

I'll be brief. My name is Steve Womack. I'm a full-time resident of Port St. Joe. Bo,

Mr. Patterson, I see this as another leadership failure. I know — you're laughing again. I'll get to that. I had previously asked for your resignation after you defending Mr. Thursby's indefensible actions. Remember when —

A. I showed compassion for somebody that I --

MR. WOMACK: Can you please not cut me off, sir? It's my turn to talk. I have three minutes. If we're not — if we're talking about other things, we have more than three minutes. But when we're talking about you, we only have three minutes, and you're going to take that three minutes from me. So please —

THE MAYOR: Give him an extra two minutes.

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MR. WOMACK: Well, thank you, sir. So when you were defending Mr. Thursby, you had stated things about second chances and judgment and caring and all of these Christian ethics. You fell on his sword for a man that was clearly in the wrong. Fast forward to Friday and you're going to throw a man under the bus. You're going to ruin his livelihood, you're going to ruin his finances, you're going to ruin his reputation, you're going to ruin his family, you're his life. For what? I mean, we keep hearing the same thing. So for me personally -- and the last time I spoke to you about your leadership and your leadership failure -- I think you're bad for the city. I know you're bad. Because I've seen other places. I've been other places. I was in Iraq and Afghanistan, and I saw better leaders than you?

THE MAYOR: Thank you for your service.

MINUTES OF THE REGULAR MEETING OF THE BOARD OF CITY COMMISSIONERS FOR THE CITY OF PORT ST. JOE, FLORIDA, HELD AT 2775 GARRISON AVENUE, July 17, 2018, AT 6:00 P.M.

The following were present: Mayor Patterson, Commissioners Ashbrook, Hoffman, Langston, and Lowry. City Manager Jim Anderson, City Clerk Charlotte Pierce, and City Attorney Adam Albritton were also present.

CONSENT AGENDA

Minutes

Mayor Patterson stated that he had not had time to completely review the Gulf Bay Reporting Transcripts of the May 11, 2018, and May 15, 2018, meetings, that he had noted some errors, and asked that the Transcripts be Tabled to allow him more time to review them.

A Motion was made by Commissioner Ashbrook, second by Commissioner Lowry, to approve the Minutes of the Regular Commission Meeting on June 19, 2018, and the Workshop Meeting of June 26, 2018. All in favor; Motion carried 5-0.

PORT ST. JOE REDEVELOPMENT AGENCY (PSJRA) There was no update from the PSJRA.

City Attorney

Ordinance 547 Comprehensive Plan Update, Second Reading and Consideration of Adoption -

Ray Greer, the City Planner, shared that the state had reviewed the Comprehensive Plan Update, requested several minor changes in the language and returned the plan to the City for the changes. The changes have been made and the plan will be returned for state approval.

A Motion was made by Commissioner Ashbrook, second by Commissioner Lowry, to have the Second Reading of Ordinance 547. All in favor; Motion carried 5-0. Attorney Albritton read Ordinance 547 by Title only.

A Motion was made by Commissioner Ashbrook, second by Commissioner Lowry, to adopt Ordinance 547. All in favor; Motion carried 5-0.

Attorney Albritton requested that the North Port St. Joe P.A.C. Rezoning Request be moved up in the Agenda as Mr. Greer had worked with this.

North Port St. Joe P.A.C. Rezoning Request – Mr. Greer shared that the Future Land Use Map had been considered, neighbors that will be impacted by the proposed changes will need to be contacted by the City prior to a Workshop to discuss the overall plans, and the suggested changes. Mr. Greer will assist with the language of the notification and the City will be responsible for contacting the individuals.

It was noted that the second Port St. Joe CRA Boundary, which encompasses North Port St. Joe, for the first time since it's designation has generated value above the base year value. Questions were asked if the generated TIF funds could be used to cover the cost of the Planning Task Order and Utility Evaluation Rask Order.

Planning Task Order and Utility Evaluation Task Order

A Motion was made by Commissioner Langston, second by Commissioner Ashbrook, to ask the PSJRA to cover the cover the expense of the orders. All in favor; Motion carried 5-0.

Golf Cart Ordinance Consolidation Update – Attorney Albritton noted that he and his staff have been working on this and he should have something shortly to present to the Golf Cart Committee.

The following individuals shared their thoughts and concerns on this issue:

San Amerson, Jr., Sam Amerson, Sr., Chester Davis, Christy McElroy (noted a meeting with Northwest FL Water Management District Friday at 10 A.M. and invited the Commissioners to attend), Robert Branch, Jeremy Novak (stated he was not authorized to speak on behalf of the County or Park Committee but had emailed Mr. Anderson what was needed from County Commission Chairman, Sandy Quinn), John Fadio, Jill Bebee, Arthur Rogers, Elaine Rogers, Steve Newman, Nathan Peters, Jr., and Scott Hamilton.

After a very lengthy discussion, a Motion was made by Commissioner Hoffman, second by Commissioner Ashbrook, to Table Resolution 2018-07. Motion carried 4-1 with Mayor Patterson voting no.

Commissioner Hoffman asked that 2 residents from the Marvin and Woodward Avenue areas, 1 person from the baseball program, and 1 softball representative be added to the Tenth Street Park Committee. The request will be made to the Committee.

Turtle Center Concession Agreement -

Attorney Albrittion noted that he had been informally told that the FCCI did not agree to the terms of the lease. He suggested that the Commission either get formal rejection or ask FCCI to provide in writing what they disagree with.

Mayor Patterson shared that he had been in conversation with members of the FCCI and they would like to provide the language to be added back to the Lease.

Charles Gaddy asked that the FCCI be allowed to propose changes and bring them back at the next meeting.

A motion was made by Commissioner Ashbrook, second by Commissioner Hoffman, to offer the Concession Agreement, as written, to the FCCI.

Attorney Albritton stated that the last changes made were at the direction of the Commission.

He also noted the FCCI had not been presented with a formal offer of the final draft of the Concession Agreement, it was emailed to them prior to the June 5, 2018, Meeting and it was also on the June 19, 2018, Agenda but no one from FCCI attended the meeting. The last changes that were made, which were two months ago, were at the direction of the Commission. He advised that the Commission not take any further action, absent what he has already advised, until the FCCI will place in writing what they want and let the Commission consider that.

Commissioner Hoffman shared that he remembered discussing the gift shop idea and it was agreed that there was not going to be a gift shop allowed. Attorney Albritton stated that was reflected in the Agreement.

Pat Floyd, St. Joseph Historical Society, Inc., (SJHSI) member, noted the previous vote, and there has to be some interest in finality and not progressive negotiations. He referenced the Meetings of June 5, 2018, and June 19, 2018, and the opportunities to give suggestions had been provided. Mr. Floyd shared that what was being suggested tonight was to put back in the same terms that have already been taken out and approved by the Commission. He reminded the Commission of the compromises that had been made by the SJHSI: the 60 day notice for FCCI to vacate the building for the reassembling of the lens, the 18 months only lease, and agreeing for the sale of t-shirts but no full gift shop. He stated another vote was not need, either agree to the terms or find another location. A conclusion was reached on June 5, 2018.

Commissioner Ashbrook countered with the FCCI had not been given a contract.

Commissioner Hoffman noted that FCCI was provided, via email, the agreement prior to June 5, 2018, and it was on the t June 19, 2018, Agenda.

Commissioner Hoffman stated that if the FCCI was not comfortable with what we voted on and sent them, and have not responded at this point, at least the clock has started, if FCCI is not comfortable with the lease, something should have been noted and the lease should have started June 5, 2018; negotiations need to stop and don't continue postponing it.

Mayor Patterson questioned if the FCCI could be denied the opportunity to have a gift shop and the response was "Yes."

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Jessica Swindall of the FCCI stated, from the back of the room, that the FCCI objected to the terms of the Lease.

Mel Magidson, Jr., SJHSI member, noted that currently the primary focus of the SJHSI is to reassemble the lens with proceeds from the gift shop going to that purpose. He noted that a fund raising campaign has been started to reassemble the lens.

Commissioner Ashbrook withdrew his Motion and Commissioner Hoffman withdrew his second,

Commissioner Langston asked Mrs. Pierce how long the SJHSI had been operating the gift shop. She responded that, originally when it was at the cape, they ran it for the county. When the facility was closed at the cape, the gift shop was relocated to the Maddox House until the facility was moved to town in 2014, and it has been run by the SJHSI for many years.

Commissioners Langston asked if the Commissioner didn't agree at their last meeting to allow the FCCI to sell t-shirts only. The Commissioners agreed that his statement was correct.

Commissioner Hoffman asked since FCCI had rejected the agreement, where does it put the Commission from today forward.

Attorney Albritton, noted for the record that from the back of the room, FCCI, had rejected the agreement and as it stands, and feels this concludes this issue.

Attorney Albritton read aloud Form 8B, Memorandum of Voting Conflict that was completed by Commissioner Lowry in reference to his abstention of voting on June 19, 2018, concerning the Coastal Plantation Development Order Request of JR & JR Holdings LLC & BGR 7 14 LLC Mr. Lowry is a business associate of developer Ralph Rish.

CITY MANAGER'S REPORT - Jim Anderson

Old Business

Road Bond Money Update -

Mr. Anderson noted a schedule for paving has been received. Paving of Long Avenue is scheduled for July 30, 2018, and Reid Avenue paving begins on August 5, 2018. Needed materials for the downtown waterlines have not been approved and additional ways to fund this project is being considered.

New Business

Small Cities Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Application

Second Public Hearing and Resolution 2018-08 Authorizing CDBG Grant Application – Mayor Patterson paused the meeting for the Public Hearing. Bruce Ballister, representing the Apalachee Regional Planning Council, reviewed the application process explaining that the number of beneficiaries was a limiting factor and that in order to be competitive, the amount of funding would need to be reduced from the \$650,000 available for Port St. Joe. After a review of the numbers for the grant, Mr. Ballister noted that an additional area and money from the City would be needed to provide a positive score for the grant application. A Motion was made by Commissioner Langston, second by Commissioner Ashbrook, to adopt Resolution 2018-08 CDBG Application. All in favor; Motion carried 5-0.

Fair Housing Workshop – Bruce Ballister conducted a Fair Housing Workshop for elected officials which included reviewing Unlawful Housing Practices, Exemption and Exceptions, the Administrators Authority and Responsibilities, Complaints, Processing Complaints, as well as Education and Public Information. Mr. Ballister noted, for the record, that the mayor and all commissioners were present.

Resolution 2018-09 Fair Housing Policy – A Motion was made by Commissioner Lowry, second by Commissioner Langston, to approve the Fair Housing Policy. All in favor; Motion carried 5-0.

Mayor Patterson resumed the Commission meeting.

DR-420 Proposed Millage Rate – Mr. Anderson noted the current Millage rate is 3.5914 and has been this rate for more than 10 years. He reminded the Commission that once the DR-420 is submitted, you cannot raise the Millage, but it can be reduced.

A Motion was made by Commissioner Ashbrook, second by Commissioner Lowry, that for budgetary purposes, the DR-420 reflect a proposed Millage rate of 4.5914. All in favor; Motion carried 5-0.

Audubon Sign Request – Consensus was not to allow the sign as it will only open up more requests for signage.

City of Apalachicola Utility Letter – Staff is to talk with City of Apalachicola officials to set up a meeting on this project.

Washington Museum Roof - Commissioner Langston

Staff will look at the roof, if the repairs are minor they will be taken care of. If major repairs are needed, the issue will be brought back to the Commission.

Public Works - John Grantland

Water Meters - Replacement Update: There will be a meeting Thursday to review the Punch List.

Jones Homestead Sewer – There are 48 paid customers for the project which leave 17 available slots for other residents to sign up to receive the reduced cost of installation. Work began last week on Plantation Drive for the project.

Fishing Piers – Clifford Sims Park – A Motion was made by Commissioner Ashbrook, second by Commissioner Lowry, to bid this project. All in favor; Motion carried 5-0. Funds for this project will come from the Fishing Express docking fees.



CONSENT AGENDA

Minutes

A Motion was made by Commissioner Buzzett, second by Commissioner Ashbrook, to approve the Minutes of the Regular Commission Meeting on June 5, 2018, the Special Meeting of June 13, 2018, and the Workshop Meeting on June 14, 2018. All in favor; Motion carried 5-0.

Mayor Patterson recognized retiring Commissioner Rex Buzzett for his 10 years of dedicated service to the City and presented him with a plaque for his service. Commissioner Buzzett thanked the citizens for the opportunity to serve and wished the Commissioners well in their future endeavors. He shared a favorite quote from Sir Winston Churchill "We make a living by what we get, but we make a life by what we give" and reminded the Commissioners he was leaving the Commission in great financial shape and charged them to take good care of the finances.

Swearing in of elected Officials

Gulf County Judge Timothy J. McFarland administered the Oath of Office to returning Commissioners Eric Langston and Brett Lowry and incoming Commissioner Group IV, Scott Hoffman. Family members of each Commissioner participated in the Swearing in Ceremony.

PORT ST. JOE REDEVELOPMENT AGENCY (PSJRA) There was no update on this.

City Attorney Albritton shared that the Florida Coastal Conservancy, Inc., objected to the terms of the proposed lease. This item will be on the Agenda for the July 17, 2018, meeting.

The attorney also read aloud Form 8B, Memorandum of Voting Conflict that was completed by Commissioner Lowry in reference to his abstention of voting on June 5, 2018, concerning the possible extension on the PSJ CRA. Mr. Lowry is an employee of the Gulf County Board of County Commissioners and they voted 5-0 not to support the renewal or extension of the CRA.

CITY MANAGER'S REPORT - Jim Anderson


Old Business



I was requested to review Item #1 – Reid Avenue water materials, bores, and patches (\$97,307.03) to determine whether this project could be funded under the City's portion of the Gas Tax Revenue Bond, Series 2015. After reviewing of the Bond documents, Florida Statutes, Attorney General's Opinions, and discussion with our Bond Legal Counsel, I regret to say that water line repairs or improvements beneath a roadway do not qualify as a lawful expenditure of the Gas Tax Bond proceeds.

Since Item #1 does not qualify, the City will need to submit an alternative eligible project for consideration.

Mayor Patterson and Members of the Commission:

The ARPC has been successful in its efforts to obtain and coordinate and close several Community Development Block Grants (CDBG) for the City of Port St Joe over the past twelve years. We seek to continue to provide these services as projects, opportunities, and funding from that agency permit.

Florida's Administration of the HUD-CDBG grant process allows Regional Planning Councils to represent their local governments in grant application and administration without participating in the RFP for services procedures.

It is anticipated that the total amount of the grant sought will be the City's maximum of \$650,000.00. The standard allowable fee structure in the CDBG program allows for the fee to be based on 8% of the total award or \$52,000. However, our total charge, which is reimbursable by CDBG, will be \$52,000 less any expenses utilized by the City to use in advertising.

Based on HUD policy the surveys ARPC conducted in 2013 and 2014 will be not able to be used as documentation for this cycle. We will begin these surveys upon confirmation of probable service areas by the City's engineer. We will endeavor to work with the engineer to maximize the services that can be performed in the \$598,000 allowable for construction. If, the award for the project should be less than the anticipated \$650,000, the ARPC charges would be a maximum of 8% of that total as allowed by the CDBG regulations.

Upon acceptance of the grant and preliminary notification of award, the ARPC will submit to the City an Environmental Review submission reimbursement request for \$8,000. From time to time throughout the construction administration phase of the grant the ARPC will submit invoices for Administration Services not to exceed the ratio of work completed. As the project nears completion 10% of the total fee will be held pending final closeout. Upon submission of closeout documents to DEO we will submit our invoice to the City for the final ten percent with the total maximum charges for grant writing and administration not to exceed: \$52,000.00.

Upon notification of award of a CDBG grant to the City, the ARPC will present a formal Administrative Services Agreement for execution referencing the CDBG Contract. No invoices will be presented to the City until after completion of grant contracts with the Department of Economic Opportunity and upon their acceptance of our formal Administrative Services Agreement. If the city should, at its own discretion, determine that it will not submit an application for the proposed work to CDBG, we would ask to be reimbursed for demonstrable time and charges applied to the project up to the point of that determination. Mayor Patterson and Members of the Commission:

The ARPC has been successful in its efforts to obtain and coordinate and close several Community Development Block Grants (CDBG) for the City of Port St Joe over the past twelve years. We seek to continue to provide these services as projects, opportunities, and funding from that agency permit.

Florida's Administration of the HUD-CDBG grant process allows Regional Planning Councils to represent their local governments in grant application and administration without participating in the RFP for services procedures.

Due to the los-density demographics of the neighborhood, we are unable to submit a competitive grant if requesting the full \$650,000 the city is eligible for. In the past working those full capacity grants, the ARPC has been remunerated for its expenses and in normal cases did not lose financial ground in the administration of the CDBG grants to Port St. Joe. When there were additional add-ons to the grant, such as a land use amendment for the North Florida Child Development Center, or ADA improvements to the Centennial Building and the City Hall's public restrooms, we have gone in the red.

All grant payable fees for Administration are limited to 8.0% of the total award. Hence, if the current application is submitted for \$500,000, our maximum grant reimbursable amount would be \$40,000. We therefore submit that in order to properly serve the City we would request that pending the final grant award, that the City reimburse the ARPC for an additional \$10,000 for a total contract amount of \$50,000. This amount is based on an estimated construction cost prior to completed engineering plans. If the Engineer's estimate comes close the maximum \$510,000, the City's obligation would be reduced to \$9,200.

We have worked with the City Manager, Utilities Director, and Engineer to develop the best possible scenario for this application. As we indicated in the public hearing on July 17th, it will be somewhat reduced from the maximum points available due to the low number of households per length of new sewer. We have sought to maximize wherever else possible, to increase the City's score.

Upon acceptance of the grant and preliminary notification of award, the ARPC will submit to the City a reimbursable grant application submission request for \$8,000. From time to time throughout the construction administration phase of the grant the ARPC will submit invoices for Administration Services not to exceed the ratio of work completed. As the project nears completion, 10% of the total fee will be held pending final closeout. Upon submission of closeout documents to DEO, we will submit our invoice to the City for the final ten percent with the total maximum charges for grant writing and administration not to exceed: \$50,000.00.

To Mr. Jim Anderson City Manager of Port St. Joe and Port St. Joe City Commission

On October 18th, 2017 you sent a letter to the residents of Palm Breeze Way, which is outside of the city boundaries, indicating that the city had decided to run a sewer "in the vicinity" of our street and you were interested in determining "how many property owners with existing homes, businesses, or homes under construction were interested in connection to the City Sanitary Sewer System". You also indicated costs would be determined "once we know the full scope of the work to be performed". The vast majority of residents of our community took the wording of that letter to mean it was a survey of interest and did not elect to respond as our community is under Gulf County not the city of Port St. Joe and more than half the residences have almost new septic systems. In my opinion the letter was very misleading.

The second letter of November 13 was worded more as if the sewer project was already decided. When word filtered around the neighborhood that the sewer construction was actually already planned by the city and would prevent us from septic repairs in the future, residents began to question just how it was that Port St. Joe decided for us that a sewer would be installed. Palm Breeze Way is a dead-end single road with no public buildings on it necessitating a sewer expansion. Very few residents have any reason to regularly attend City Commission meetings as we are not part of the City and have no representation or vote there.

Both letters stressed how much money people might save by signing up now to the sewer system versus in the future, but did not attempt to provide any real cost estimates for residents regarding switching from our current septic systems to sewer. The \$400 tap fee mentioned is only part of the costs, I contacted a contractor to get a general estimate on other costs. They were as follows: pump septic: \$250, Crush/Fill septic: \$550, Haul off drain field: \$1500, plus money for installation of grinder pump which depends on how far it is from the house. Many of our residents are still paying for their current septic systems and now you are asking them to pay to destroy it and pay more to hook to sewer and then pay monthly fees for using that. Quite a few of our residents are retired and on fixed incomes, others are part time residents who likely do not want to pay monthly sewer costs when they are not even here.

When I attended a City Commission meeting on July 17th, 2018 and the report was made on the sewer project, I asked whether any public meetings or input of any kind was obtained from our community and I was informed that there was not. I understand from the Gulf County BOCC (I attended their meeting and spoke with several officials on July 24th) that this grant and sewer extension is entirely the city of Port St. Joe's project and the County is not involved in any way. I will say once again, Palm Breeze Way is not the property of the City of Port St. Joe. Many of us moved out here deliberately so we would not be a part of city regulations, restrictions, taxes, and politics.

To get a more accurate read on the entire neighborhood, rather than just a few that I knew personally, I decided to go door to door and ask each neighbor that I could reach if they had received and read the letters from you and if they wished a sewer system to be run on our road or to sign a petition in opposition if they did not. I am submitting to you today the results of that survey and the petition.

There are 50 lots in the neighborhood and 13 are vacant and completely undeveloped. Of the vacant lots, 1 has somehow signed up for the grant money, even though the lot has not even been cleared and should not be eligible according to your letters (i.e. letter number one states:

"Vacant lots do not qualify for the grant."). 3 other vacant lots are owned by persons who signed the petition opposing a sewer.

Of the 37 residences, 6 persons have signed up for sewer. Of these 6, 1 is the only rental property on the street, 1 is a home for sale, and 4 are current (3 part time and 1 full time resident owner). None of these 4 actually requested sewer to be run to the neighborhood however. 1 of these 4 also indicated they only signed up because they were afraid of the line in the letter from you that they would not be able to repair their septic in the future, but they would prefer the sewer <u>not</u> be run and they be allowed to repair their septic if it breaks.

Of the 31 remaining homes. 16 of the residents that I was able to contact do not want the sewer and signed the petition to that effect. 4 that I contacted did not sign the petition to prevent the sewer being run for various reasons, but have not signed up for sewer at this time (3 of the 4 have less than 3 year old septic systems).

I have not been able to make contact with the other 11 homeowners. 10 are part time residents (some less than a month per year and I would surmise do not want monthly sewer bills), or are empty homes or houses in the process of sale. However, 3 of these part time residents indicated to neighbors they do not want the sewer run but were not present to sign the petition at this time. I was not able to reach 1 full time resident after five attempts.

We are requesting at this time that you accept this letter, petition and informal survey and: 1) That you make a more formal survey of Palm Breeze Way to establish whether or not connecting to Port St. Joe sewer is desired by a *majority* of residents, and that said survey be made available to residents before any construction is begun. 2) That if it is determined that the majority of home owners do not want to be connected to Port St. Joe sewer system, then your plans be altered to that effect. 3) If cancellation of sewer installation plans is not done by the city assuming a majority of residents do not want it, we request that the City Attorney inform the residents under what ordinance, regulation, or law the city can run a sewer without our input, consent or representation as non-residents of the City of Port St. Joe.

PUBLIC HEALTH

PUBLIC HEALTH: GENERAL PROVISIONS

381.00655 Connection of existing onsite sewage treatment and disposal systems to central sewerage system; requirements.—

- (1)(a) The owner of a properly functioning onsite sewage treatment and disposal system, excluding an approved onsite graywater system, must connect the system or the building's plumbing to an available publicly owned or investor-owned sewerage system within 365 days after written notification by the owner of the publicly owned or investor-owned sewerage system that the system is available for connection. The publicly owned or investor-owned sewerage system must notify the owner of the onsite sewage treatment and disposal system of the availability of the central sewerage system. No less than 1 year prior to the date the sewerage system will become available, the publicly owned or investor-owned sewerage system shall notify the affected owner of the onsite sewage treatment and disposal system of the anticipated availability of the sewerage system and shall also notify the owner that the owner will be required to connect to the sewerage system within 1 year of the actual availability. The owner shall have the option of prepaying the amortized value of required connection charges in equal monthly installments over a period not to exceed 2 years from the date of the initial notification of anticipated availability. Nothing in this section shall operate to impair contracts or other binding obligations relating to payment schedules in existence as of October 1, 1993. Nothing in this paragraph limits the power of a municipality or county to enforce other laws for the protection of the public health and safety.
- (b) The owner of an onsite sewage treatment and disposal system that needs repair or modification to function in a sanitary manner or to comply with the requirements of ss. 381.0065-381.0067 or rules adopted under those sections must connect to an available publicly owned or investor-owned sewerage system within 90 days after written notification from the department. In hardship cases, upon request of the owner, the department may approve an extension of not more than 90 days for sewerage connection. The department may approve only one extension. This paragraph does not authorize the owner of the onsite sewage treatment and disposal system to create or maintain a sanitary nuisance.
 - (2) The provisions of subsection (1) or any other provision of law to the contrary notwithstanding:
- (a) The local governing body of the jurisdiction in which the owner of the onsite sewage treatment and disposal system resides may provide that any connection fee charged under this section by an investor-owned sewerage system may be paid without interest in monthly installments, over a period of time not to exceed 5 years from the date the sewerage system becomes available if it determines that the owner has demonstrated a financial hardship. The local governing body shall establish criteria for making this determination which take into account the owner's net worth, income, and financial needs.
- (b) A publicly owned or investor-owned sewerage system may, with the approval of the department, waive the requirement of mandatory onsite sewage disposal connection if it determines that such connection is not required in the public interest due to public health considerations.

- sewer system under s. 153.62 may grant a variance to an owner of a performance-based onsite sewage treatment and disposal system permitted by the department as long as the onsite system is functioning properly and satisfying the conditions of the operating permit. Nothing in this paragraph shall be construed to require a local government or water and sewer district to issue a variance under any circumstance. Nothing in this paragraph shall be construed as limiting local government authority to enact ordinances under s. 4, chapter 99-395, Laws of Florida. A local government or water and sewer district located in any of the following areas shall not be required to issue a variance under any circumstance:
 - 1. An area of critical state concern.
- 2. An area that was designated as an area of critical state concern for at least 20 consecutive years prior to removal of the designation.
- 3. An area in the South Florida Water Management District west C-11 basin that discharges through the S-9 pump into the Everglades.
 - 4. An area designated by the Lake Okeechobee Protection Act. History.—s. 2, ch. 93-151; s. 5, ch. 2006-252.

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
